



The sender wrote on March 16, 1908, "Spent a portion of yesterday sunning myself on the bench marked '\sqrt' and gazing at this wonderful freak of Nature. 13 miles wide here and 7000 feet above sea level at the rim."

This card, written by "Fred," was mailed to Miss M. E. Bockius at the Carnegie Library, Camden, New Jersey. Research determines that she was Martha Elizabeth Bockius (1877–1939), librarian, who never married and at this time resided with her parents in nearby Pennsauken. By the time of the 1930 U.S. Census she was a secretary for a "patriotic society" in Philadelphia, residing with her brother. (*Corroborative residential, occupational, and other personal data from public records via Ancestry.com.*)





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ABSTRACT

"Too Numerous To Name" is an annotated biographical bibliography that cites published works which contain biographically relevant information about individuals who were present, or who undertook activities, at the Grand Canyon or on the Colorado River in the canyon. This is not a comprehensive bibliography of works by these people, nor does it direct to unpublished source materials. Compendia of publications by or about these people that are fundamentally less personal in nature, such as scholarly works and commonplace publications, are available elsewhere. Pertinent cross-references to some of those compendia are occasionally supplied herein.

The people in this annotated biographical bibliography are parts of the history of the Grand Canyon or the Colorado River, regardless of how widely or not they are recognized. While many of them realized significant, even life-long, activities here, others were simply "famous visitors" passing through. Statements about such visits have often been made without providing sources for that information. This volume helps to resolve that deficiency.

There are as well individuals who are only tiny historical cogs of peculiar or passing interest—yet they appeared in print. Some of them will be new even to Grand Canyon historians and aficionados, for the reason that they were noticed fleetingly, perhaps once or twice in a century or more of publications. Here they are recognized, eluding historical expiration.

Separate lists are provided for anthologies and retrospective collections. They help fill the gap between the publications cited herein and other, wide-ranging works that may intersperse biographically pertinent information. It is not the purpose of this bibliography to comprise a master index to all publications. It does, however, find many noteworthy people and discovers many who might never have been recognized as having had a place in the annals of the canyon and its river.

A biographical bibliography for the Grand Canyon has not existed before. This is a first-effort product, so some users surely will note omissions. There is much room for inspiration and growth.

PREFACE

"...many more too numerous to name..." This phrase caught my eye. On the fly, the article in which it appeared dashed off a few names of famous people who had been to the Grand Canyon, finishing with this flirting remark. Of the names that were noticed, why were they chosen, from what sources? And who were the ones that couldn't be squeezed in or, more to the point, were dismissed out of hand? In this fashion over the years, magazine and newspaper articles have repeatedly hurried onto pages the names of some famous people who had stopped by the Grand Canyon; usually without elaboration. The lists seem arbitrary, as if picked even from other lists. But where is the evidence for any of these visits; evidence that can be cited (with certainty), items that people can find if they need them? And then, what of the subjectively non-famous people? No one seems to bother with them, at least not as an inclusive gathering.

The "famous" who come to the canyon are often with official entourages, or at the least are specially met and conducted around at a time when they retain significant name recognition. Such stopovers do not come without consequences; these people do not travel alone. A canyon break by the likes of President <u>Barack Obama</u> and his family while he was in office, or when retired President <u>Richard Nixon</u> stopped by, can be disruptive for visitors who, having traveled all that way, are confronted by road and area closures, security entourages, and extra-attentive Park Service personnel beyond the protective perimeter. Less commotional because it took place far from the crowds was Senator <u>Bobby Kennedy</u>'s family break rafting on the Colorado River, but the trip was still excitedly captured in the national press.

The Obama visit was not an official visit; the family was on vacation. Even though the canyon stop by the sitting president was relatively short, wherever they went the public was cordoned off. Their presence upset the routines and movements of Grand Canyon residents, too, although according to a local newspaper account many of them

were more thrilled to witness the spectacle of a Boeing 747 (Air Force One) land at the Grand Canyon National Park Airport in nearby Tusayan. The Nixon visit, on the other hand, was as if he were a celebrity who caught his fellow visitors by surprise; he signed autographs.

When President <u>Bill Clinton</u> helicoptered aboard Marine One from the South Rim to remote Tuweep in western Grand Canyon, to ceremonially sign an Antiquities Act proclamation that created the new Grand Canyon–Parashant National Monument, security in the wide-open rangeland dictated an emergency "safe" place—in the bathtub of the ranger's residence, covered by bullet-proof blankets. National Park Service rangers <u>Liz and Clair Roberts</u> recalled that they thought they should make sure the tub was cleaned beforehand.²

And President <u>Joe Biden</u> was ushered to the old Red Butte Airfield south of Tusayan. There, in the presence of Native American tribal members in the shadow of sacred Red Butte, he signed an Antiquities Act proclamation that created the Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni–Ancestral Footprints of the Grand Canyon National Monument to help protect the cultural and environmental landscapes surrounding the national park.

Added to those of prominence—who simply by showing up was news in itself—there are, oh, so many people who *did* things at the canyon and along its river. Some of them are legendary, whether they are devoted canyonophiles or canyon gatecrashers (for example, <u>Harvey Butchart</u> and <u>Colin Fletcher</u>, respectively). And others—well, to most people they are unknown, especially those who were just in some unremarkable job function. Their kind show up spottily in publications, as unexciting news notes, though once in a while as subjects of curiosity or amusement, like those who dared the devil by leaping over deep crevasses or actually falling into the canyon in stunts. To them add the legions of tourists who stayed hours or weeks, some of them writing of their experiences and embracing their thoughts for us; publications that have been captured in the citations herein and in other bibliographies. Everyone mentioned here is part of the record. The published literature grabs bits and pieces of their doings,

which have been collated here before they fully fade away like weather-worn gravestones. And through the citations those bits and pieces can be used as documentary evidence for one thing or another, or if necessary be found again (most with reasonable ease).

For decades we have had the handy and profuse Marquis *Who's Who* publications that gather up notable and less renowned people of the world. This bio-bibliography serves in the same vein, while restricting its subjects to those who passed by or through (or sometimes over) Grand Canyon. It takes a step further, by adding to the merely and nearly famous those "who should be who" and quite a number who are "who!?" Yet everyone of these people made it into print, parts of the canyon story. Why should the less conspicuous ones be passed over because "they weren't anybody"? One never knows who or what event will be of interest—significance, even—to someone now or far in the future who has a task at hand, a hunt in mind, or a looming deadline. They can dismiss specific people who appear in this volume, but to not have been informed of them in the first place is indefensible.

Naturally, a number of people listed in this bio-bibliography are well remembered. Others are recognized within limited circles. Some are casually known to a few. And probably more than a scattering are rescued before they unconditionally vanish from history. It is this last group that might be of wider-than-expected interest *because* of their inconspicuousness; each of them is likely to be new and might inspire interest. It is easy to grasp hold of the news of a famous person passing by, or a memorable "doer" doing their thing, but a writer or an editor, somewhere, had once thought it momentarily worthwhile to notice a person on the farthest seat in the theater, even if just in a few lines to help fill out a magazine page—and then I recovered them in the process of bibliographing my way around the world on behalf of the canyon and river.

My journey has thus far been fifty years in the making³, beginning with things that rested on wooden and metal shelves, eventually moving into the electric wildness

I began the Grand Canyon–Lower Colorado River project in September 1974. The first published bibliography was produced by the Grand Canyon Natural History Association in 1981—the time-honored way, from typewritten manuscript to typeset galley proofs to inkprint volume. The bibliography graduated in 1990 to concomitant releases as loose-leaf inkprint, microfiche, and ASCII-format (text-only) digital disks (5¼-inch "floppies"), with a similarly produced supplement in 1993. In 2000 the bibliography became a searchable database online, which survived until 2021 before succumbing to technological difficulties; but in 2010 I began preparations for the digital, book-format PDF replacement of the monograph, which is *The Grand Canon* now in three separately compiled, topically distinct

of web-posted publications and documents.⁴ I recognize that there are books, magazines and newsletters of which I am unaware that will contain things written by or about people who visited or did things at Grand Canyon. These items, wherever they are, are phantoms; so be it. Someday they may be found by another compiler or a historian working on something.

A marvelous advantage of the web is its access to public and genealogical records. A number of people listed in this volume are accorded more biographical information than had been gleaned from the publications cited here, helping to make them a little more humanly interesting without dipping into the barrel of exhaustive biography. Thus, for example, many people have full names and dates that were not available even in their obituaries. A few additional notes may also be added that allow the reader to know a bit about what it is these people did in their lives other than their having worked at or stopped by the canyon or run down (or up!) its river. One will see that a great number of them were conspicuous players within their own occupational fields; and thus in a sense they too are "famous" visitors, whether they arrived before, during, or after their time of greatest public notability.

Obviously there is a lot more that can be done to create a truly comprehensive and more informative biographical bibliography, not the least part of which would be to include photographs. But at this time the prospect of hunting down so many sources—and permissions to reuse if they are not in the public domain—is unmanageable, perhaps unimaginable, for one person. It would also hugely expand the size of this volume even when many people would still lack photographs. Images of the more notable ones can be seen widely on the web anyway. Nonetheless, the opportunity is taken in this volume to include references to selected photographs that appear in widely available, still in print, pictorial publications, as noted more fully in the Introduction.

A substantial number of historically focused publications can be dissected further in order to obtain more biographical information and new additions to the list of people. The reason this has not been done here is that such effort is similar to indexing

volumes; and from these other specialized bibliographies and historical works are available through Raven's Perch Media (https://ravensperch.org).

a book—a much more time-consuming process that anyway is not the purpose of this general bio-bibliography.

Readers may be delightfully surprised by the people and activities about which they never knew. True, quite a number of them are "minor" players in the Grand Canyon–Colorado River story. Some users may toss them aside as not being parties to their interests. But then again, a few users might in fact *become* interested in the bit parts played by these people—so here they are.

This work even manages to corral a few animals of special notice, too (see a list on <u>p. 81</u>, preceding the annotated bibliography). "Chiggers" the mule, for one, would have been unknown had Grand Canyon tourist <u>Elmer Mateas</u> not sued Fred Harvey for injuries sustained when he was bucked from the saddle. It was a case that he won in the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and which later exercised the legal mind of Mason Ladd, a prominent law professor who animatedly entertained his students with a rendition of the events on the trail and the litigious path through the courts.

All this said, the likes of this work has not appeared from the pen or keyboard of anyone before me. Even with its shortcomings, it will be useful until someone else again takes up the task to better it. Yet—alas—bibliographies are not generally seen as fireside reading⁵ and modern publishers take on only the most historically (and moreso those that are economically) promising ones because publishing a bibliography as such really forecasts few users and lean sales. This may thus discourage further work on this and other bibliographies. Still, such compilations provide *information*—facts which at one time or another, to one person at a time, now and long into the future, may be useful toward whatever task is at hand. Thus I do this work for the few and the future; hopefully it is helpful. And the Raven's Perch Media offerings are all produced free of charge, with downloads and permanent retention permitted.

I finish with some fairly inconsequential incidents reported by lesser known Grand Canyon visitors, which interestingly, in the midst of the time when travelers often spent many days at the canyon, herald modern-day reports that few visitors spend much time actually viewing the canyon. In 1912, Quaker missionary and art collector <u>Susan Janney Allen</u> visited the canyon but wrote only of her Hopi House shopping, finishing,

"But I must hurry on to California" In 1913, Charles E. Jefferson, the long-serving pastor of New York's Broadway Tabernacle, recalled, "I once heard a man standing near the edge of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado and say to a friend near him: 'I wonder how soon we can get out of here.' He had looked at the canyon possibly two minutes, and he had gotten enough of it." And in 1922 Annette Thackwell Johnson recalled a young woman's barely substantiated dismissal of the canyon, which then was a new national park: "'No, we don't care much for it,' declared the bride. 'And I'm awfully disappointed in the colors. I thought we'd have blue and violet instead of all that henna! I'm so fond of blue We think we'd rather spend what extra time we have at the Los Angeles beaches—Venice, for instance. So we are going to catch the ten o'clock train.'"

So, one can *read* this bio-bibliography if they have a mind to—the pleasure is in the details—and in doing so make discoveries one by one. Jump in anywhere. Try it; you may not wonder how soon you can get out of here!

WANDERERS' WONDERS

Canyon Club

NNOUNCEMENT of the formation of the Canyon Club in New York City was received today by the Department of the Interior. Membership in this unique club is limited to men and women who have visited Zion Canyon in Zion National Park, Bryce Canyon National Monument and Cedar Breaks Canyon in southwestern Utah, and have viewed the Grand Canyon National Park, Arizona, from the north The canyons of southwestern Utah are the most vivid and richest exhibits of coloring of the materials of the earth. The north rim of the Grand Canyon may be visited by automobile from Utah points in connection with a trip to the painted canyons.

The Canyon Club proposes to hold informal meetings once a year and hear from persons, who have visited this section and to see photographs and lantern slides made by individual members. Members of the club are pledged to further the interests of these great national scenic reservations in every way possible.

At the first meeting held in the Explorers' Club in New York City members from Massachusetts, New York City, and Washington, D. C., attended. Mr. Matthew Hale of Washington, D. C., was elected president, and Mr. Stephen S. Johnson of New York City, secretary.

Head Count

"Too Numerous To Name" includes 1,969 enumerated entries, but the actual number of unique individuals noted in the biographical bibliography is counted differently. Subtract from this number 58 enumerated entries that relate to special-interest groups and to specially noticed animals, rather than to specific individuals; four enumerated entries that tell of familial groups that are otherwise represented by enumerated individuals; and two entries that combine citations for individuals who are also separately accounted for. Appended to many of the entries are people who are in some way associated with the person who is the principal subject of that entry; there are 421 such individuals. Also listed together in one special-interest entry are the 128 people who perished in the airline disaster of June 30, 1956. Thus, 549 individuals are adjoined to the count of separately enumerated entries. Two of the special-interest groups (Grand Canyon Historical Society and the River Runners Hall of Fame) list recipients of various awards who are not figured into the total here because many of them are already counted through their own enumerated entries. Also not figured into the Head Count is the complete roster of the "First 100" river runners through the Grand Canyon noted under Otis Reed "Dock" Marston, which, as explained at that point herein, duplicates an uncertain number of individuals not all of whom hold the conditions necessary to be cited in this bio-bibliography.

This biographical bibliography as it now stands accounts for 2,454 people.

INTRODUCTION

THIS BIOGRAPHICAL BIBLIOGRAPHY documents published records of the presence and activities of people (and a few animals) at the Grand Canyon and on the Colorado River. Some items are written by the people themselves, others contribute information about the subjects. To be a little more useful, as often as possible notes indicate when these people lived and briefly summarizes what they did more generally. This volume does not delve into the wealth of unpublished records (like administrators' reports, manuscripts, casual collations not distributed in multiple copies, and so forth), and thus many individuals who would otherwise be certain, topically, to be included herein are absent.

This is a first-effort project, one based solely on published material. The key objective of this collection is to provide conveniently citable sources, many of them easy to find. Most of them will also tell, if not directly then from their publication dates, specifically or within a range of time when these people were present or active at the canyon or on the river.

I.

One does not have to "be someone" or to have "done something special" to be included in these pages; their presence is usually enough. If they did something out of the ordinary, so much the better; it makes for interesting stories. If they were "famous" and were only passing by the canyon without "doing" anything there, it serves to further verify the international draw of the canyon. And they had to have appeared in print—items which users can find if they wish. After all, this is a biographical *bibliography*; but this does not include digitally ephemeral material such as podcasts, "blogs," and general web pages ⁶

Notable people who have been to the canyon may have visited just once. Through their contemplations and reflections of the experience, however brief or effusive, their

w. E. B. Du Bois and Mahatma Gandhi. Others of notability who touched base at the canyon are listed simply on the basis of their fame, not having any historical connection to the canyon or river, and having not themselves published anything about their visits though they were accompanied by flurries of public attention; for example, Albert Einstein (the "Great Relative" who with Mrs. Einstein just stopped) or Sweden's Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf and Crown Princess Louise (who rode mules across the canyon to enjoy stays on both rims).

To be included here, a person usually had to have had boots on the ground, oars or motor in the water, or wings in the air—and wrote about it themselves or were written about by others. A refreshing majority of these people are listed because they were there and because they did do something: historical, noteworthy, motivating, or some peculiar accomplishment or activity. The cited publications were produced in multiple copies, thus they can be found in libraries or through web-based resources; the latter usually in PDF format that is a facsimile of the original or is produced specifically to be printed out or viewed in book-like format (such as this very volume). Unique productions and manuscript sources, even though they are historically and scholastically valuable, are not considered because most general users of this bio-bibliography will not have ready access to them. Further, to add them would turn this into a far more expansive work, one perhaps not as attractive for regular use. This is not a work of historiography, but biographical proof of presence or activity—and documentation of it.

A bio-bibliography has the advantage of arranging items by person, regardless of whether they were the author or the subject. The citations with their annotations comprise sources of biographically useful information, whether incidental or at full length, as it fits in with Grand Canyon or Colorado River history. For the most part, though, this work stops short of listing technical, scientific, or scholarly publications that these people may have produced. Such publications are the result of applied work without overt biographical intent; they are too far afield to be pertinent here. All Grand Canyon–Lower Colorado River publications that relate to research or studies by individual people, or which are commonplace publications that lack explicit biographical content, can anyway be found in the comprehensive 32 subject-specific parts of *The Grand Canon: Volume 1.*7 Cross-listings are inserted in the present volume that direct

Libraries and not-for-profit organizations are encouraged to incorporate some or all of them in their holdings of digital publications, with liberal rights to reproduction. Newer editions of the various Raven's Perch productions are

the reader to the various parts of *The Grand Canon* that contain less biographically pertinent publications by these people.

Travelers' accounts of their visits to Grand Canyon are widely scattered in the published literature, in serial publications or as part of longer travelogues or memoirs. Users are here referred to two separate publications that comprise an annotated bibliography and anthology of published Grand Canyon encounters; even those of casual tourists who in some fashion, briefly or at length, shared their experiences in print.⁸ In one volume, the accounts that were in the public domain at the time of publication (through 1926) are quoted, often in their entirety, and where necessary they were translated to English, for the first time. The broader bibliography that adds citations to its time of publication (2022) also transcribes the original foreign-language texts in addition to the translations; these are cross-listed to the public-domain compilation. In this bio-bibliography, cross-references to these two volumes are made where pertinent.

Two more complementary Raven's Perch publications—annotated bibliographies for artists and photographers/cinematographers—also should be consulted. Replicating herein those hundreds of names and citations would overtax this volume, so cross-references are made to them. However, to easily acknowledge those people in the context of this bio-bibliography, <u>summary lists</u> (see pp. 21-34) of the artists' and photographers' names are provided. Users can thus retrieve those art and photography volumes separately.

This bio-bibliography also does not go out of its way to cite comprehensive biographical resources about these people; that is not its purpose. Information that goes beyond the canyon and river, as ancillary notes, is occasionally provided to give additional context to these people's lives, particularly those who are not key to the history of the canyon or its river. Today's online resources will reveal far more complete biographical information. There is no need to cite those web pages because of the ease

These publications are "My God, there it is!" The World Encounters the Grand Canyon (to 1926) and The Grand Canyon! A Worldwide, Year-By-Year Anthology and Annotated Bibliography (to 2022), both published by Raven's Perch Media (https://ravensperch.org). (Users not relying on hyperlinks in the digital PDF, see the citations and web links in the section herein, "Links To Raven's Perch Media Resources That Are Referred To In This Bibliography" (p. 15).)

of searching the web and because web content is inherently ephemeral (the risk of significant or useful items ceasing to exist is real⁹). Even so, a marvelous advantage of the web is its access to public and genealogical records, so a number of people recorded in this volume are in fact provided with more biographical information derived from such web sources. This helps to make them a little more humanly interesting. Thus for example, many people are listed with full names and dates that were not available even in their obituaries. A few additional notes are added that allow the reader to know a bit about what it is these people did in their lives other than their having been at the canyon or having run down its river.

Numerous people listed herein are well known in Grand Canyon and Colorado River circles; some even may have been widely "heard of" beyond this geographically focused group. Others, though, might be surprises to those who browse these pages unaware even of the existence of these people much less what they did at the canyon. Until now, no such compilation has been available.

Some individuals who have been mentioned in print on the fly—such as in random news notes—are fortunately captured on these pages even though they have been noticed only once or twice over the years. Even so, they should be recognized inasmuch as this might be the only record of them with respect to the canyon. An example is a person mentioned in news items or recollections, which otherwise would have been publicly unknown. Then, for their novelty, there are two biographical outliers who putatively may lay claim to have "owned" the Grand Canyon even though they had not themselves laid eyes on it (see <u>Solomon Barth</u>, and <u>Juan Antonio Guevara-Calderón</u> and descendants).

Should anyone believe that this is not a significant issue, consider the fact that the jurists of the Supreme Court of the United States have at times incorporated webpage hyperlinks in their decisions, but some links soon failed due to the removal or migration of the linked material. This is a significant issue because Supreme Court opinions create legal precedent, and their cited materials contain the evidence that has led to those opinions. For an early recognition of this issue, see Adam Liptak, "In Supreme Court Opinions, Web Links to Nowhere", *The New York Times* (September 24, 2013), p. A13.

¹⁰ Three examples of those who have been rarely mentioned are: 1) <u>Sekakuku</u>, a Hopi man who had been a concessionaire employee at Grand Canyon and who received a medal from Albert, King of the Belgians for his heading the dance group at Hopi House. (Sekakuku is noted with further biographical remarks in the present biobibliography for the time of his Grand Canyon employment and his own business affairs after leaving the canyon.)
2) <u>L. H. Cochran</u>, a Santa Fe Railway brakeman injured during the visit of King Albert, to whom the king awarded a medal.
3) <u>Samuel H. Brown</u>, who is listed simply for having accepted in 1903 the position of manager of the Bright Angel Hotel, who seems never to have been recognized again in print, at least with respect to his canyon affairs.

A few liberties are also taken to include items that focus on locales not of the canyon-proper but close around the canyon; for example, Lee's Ferry, the Kaibab Plateau, and the Little Colorado River gorge. Historically and geographically (and thus traditionally) they are reckoned as part of the greater Grand Canyon.

II.

All this said, there are omissions from this bio-bibliography. Some users of this volume may already have in mind some people who they would like to look up, or others who have come to their attention for some reason, but find that these people are not listed. This is generally because I have not found Grand Canyon or Colorado River publications of direct biographical pertinence to these omitted people.¹¹

The purpose of this bio-bibliography is to provide reasonably convenient sources of information about people, in so far as they relate to the greater Grand Canyon region and its river. People not in this volume may nonetheless have contributed in various ways to the canyon's history, but without biographically pertinent publications, such as interviews, first-hand accounts of canyon activities, accounts written by others on their behalf, or selected photographs of special interest, they are absent from these pages.

People who otherwise are truly known to have been at the canyon in some activity or function, but who seem to lack published accounts of specific biographical interest,

¹¹ For example, Grand Canyon's legion through-hikers are relatively few (about 60 as of 2023, including those who completed segmented hikes the length of the canyon). A few of them make their ways into this biographical bibliography. Yet there are more who lack any publication of immediate biographical pertinence that would add them to these pages, even though they may appear in far more broad historical works. Three examples are:
Andrew Holycross, herpetologist and hiker who does have less biographically pertinent publications listed in Part 19 of *The Grand Canon*, and his wife, **Ioanna Elise Hociota**; and **Glenn Rink**, botanist, hiker, climber, and river runner who does have less biographically pertinent publications as author and coauthor listed in Parts 2, 15, and 19 of *The Grand Canon*. For their hiking accomplishments, they appear in the pages of other authors' historical reviews or personal recollections, but as I have noted, this bio-bibliography is not a master index to such works.

Then, for but one example from among transcribed but unpublished oral histories that regretfully must be omitted from this bio-bibliography, there is **Stan Mish**. He is a Grand Canyon climber and river runner who also got into hang gliding and at one time even paraglided off Comanche Point to reach a Colorado River trip! There is no published account of this astonishing feat (date not mentioned, and was unpermitted and thus illegal) but an oral history presentation by Mish in 2016 to the 4th Annual Granitica Festival at the Museum of Northern Arizona (theme: "Templed Horizon—Grand Canyon Climbing") discusses the feat. It is in the transcript of the Granitica oral histories that is posted online with the Grand Canyon Historical Society's oral histories,

may still be found in sources that are not conveniently accessible to general users. Examples of such sources are the monthly reports from Grand Canyon National Park superintendents or by other park staff, which never were formally published or publicly distributed. Delving into such records is rewarding, but this is beyond the first-effort survey represented by this bio-bibliography. These kinds of records are not conveniently accessible to the general user, who in any case may not have the expertise or the time to track them down. In the meantime, by having the citations at hand in this bio-bibliography, users do not have to depend solely on sequestered and unique records like manuscripts and special collections of papers that may be difficult for inexpert users to locate or access. 13

There are many publications that do mention people who are ignored here; those discussions or remarks are embedded within much longer texts, or sometimes they even are the subject of whole books. For example, any number of publications about river running history hold information about people that is scattered through the pages, and historically focused publications likewise are filled with the names and activities of people. Many deaths have taken place at Grand Canyon, a few of which are noted in this bio-bibliography, with pertinent citations to contemporary and more current publications. However, the number of deaths is such that one should instead refer to the very comprehensive volume, *Over the Edge: Death in Grand Canyon* by Michael P. Ghiglieri and Thomas M. Myers. The index to the 2nd edition alone contains hundreds of people's names, filling 24 pages; they are unfortunately part of the Grand Canyon's biographical record and are far too many to consign to the specialized *Too Numerous To Name* silo because of their scattered presence in *Over the Edge*. Similarly, works like Michael F. Anderson's comprehensive *Polishing the Jewel: An Administrative History of*

¹²There are also the daily log books of Ranger-Naturalist Louis Schellbach, III, transcriptions of some of which were fortunately published by his granddaughter, Traci Schellbach Wyrick. These logs take note of many people, some of whom are mentioned in Wyrick's valuable transcriptions. (*Refer to Wyrick citations under Schellbach herein.*)

¹³ For one purposely detailed example of the value of special collections, see <u>Luna Leopold</u> herein. I have had the unique opportunity to make this comparative examination of published and manuscript materials myself—a direct Grand Canyon and Colorado River connection with biographical undertones—thus this information is included for its benefit in biographically documenting Leopold's presence and activities in Grand Canyon beyond his few publications that touch upon the Grand Canyon's river. It is also an example of what can be done in a further expansion of the present work.

Grand Canyon National Park, an outgrowth of his doctoral dissertation, is solidly filled with names of interest to a biographical study of the canyon at large. ¹⁵ To find and cite all of these bibliographical occurrences across uncounted thousands of pages requires exceptionally in-depth reading. It would turn this bio-bibliography into a master index—which would not be a bad thing, but the resulting volume would be monstrously sized and it very likely would not be as engaging. For the time being, the present volume will have to suffice by offering up a first compilation of the famous and forgotten alike, with the hopes that future work will greatly improve upon it. ¹⁶

Quite a few scientists and historical scholars are omitted from this bio-bibliography because their publications do not present personal experiences and reflections upon their activities at Grand Canyon or on the Colorado River. Notable exceptions are Clarence E. Dutton and Edwin D. McKee; and other scientists' activities are embedded in the entries for particular expeditions or group activities (such as the Shiva Temple Expedition or the Trail of Time). A few of the studious publications blended the scholarly and personal; it is these that are cited herein. In any case, Grand Canyon–Colorado River scientists and scholars all have their own comprehensive bibliographies in *The Grand Canon*, *Volume 1* and *Volume 2*.

Then there are the people who I simply have missed. It is, alas, easy to point them out when these absent folks are discovered, predictably because readers, who already may have someone in mind, expect to find these people. I have had "only" a half century to work on the greater Grand Canyon–Colorado River bibliographies. Even so, I cannot possibly have found everything. It must be the task of future compilers to catch up, fill in, amplify, or to create wholly new works—if anyone is so inclined.¹⁷

¹⁶ One might hope that the promise of new developments in digital technology, including Artificial Intelligence (AI), will be able to craft such a master index. However, that will first require digital access to all of the publications, then to have algorithms and applications that can recognize, isolate, and contextualize pertinent information from those publications. Exporting such data should be invaluable toward other projects, too. Certainly, capable users of AI can also someday derive consequential products from the "dead weight" of citations assembled in any bibliography, particularly those with annotations (such as in the various Raven's Perch Media products cited herein).

¹⁷ Subsets of a biographical bibliography can be created, too—for example, for distance-hikers, river runners, Park Service or concessionaire employees, women of the National Park Service, and forever onward according to whims, needs, or curiosity. But each will satisfy only its restricted readership; the grand, comprehensive resource will still evade capture. Thus, the model of this bio-bibliography may have to suffice, to encourage its numerous gaps to be filled by conscientious (courageous?) researchers and compilers.

With the notable exception of *The New York Times*, newspapers are purposely omitted from this bio-bibliography because they are a voluminous and geographically dispersed resource far beyond the ability for one compiler to capture it all. ¹⁸ Even restricting the focus to the newspapers produced only in the geographical region of interest here is a daunting prospect. It would be useful—probably to just a few people—to have such a mammoth bibliography in hand because a tremendous amount of historical information would be there; important, transitory, and trivial alike, though not necessarily accurate.

The next step—perhaps an ultimate goal—is to add documentary references for people who, intuitively, had to have been at the canyon because of their occupational positions and the work that they have produced. This is bound to delve into official records, gray literature not considered for this first effort, and even manuscript materials. There are also the rich holdings of oral-history interviews, whose interviewees usually name numerous individuals and provide valuable biographical asides. ¹⁹ Perhaps such work will introduce a valuable biographical encyclopedia for the Grand Canyon and Colorado River.

III.

There are three groups of exceptions to the arbitrary rule of this bio-bibliography to overlook people who are mentioned miscellaneously within larger publications. In the first two groups, references are made to selected pages within several publications that are critically important to the historiography of the Colorado River in Grand Canyon and

¹⁸ As I have explained in the much more comprehensive bibliography, *The Grand Canon*, coverage from the *Times* harkens back to the original Grand Canyon–Lower Colorado River bibliography, first published in 1981. Access then was only through hardcopy and microfilm; and the *Times* was chosen for the robust national coverage, in one newspaper, of the entire time period in which Grand Canyon and Colorado River items could appear (since 1851). Today the *Times* is accessible and searchable online (nytimes.com), a significant savings of effort on the part of the researcher. I have nonetheless retained and continue this uniquely vast coverage for the canyon and river and reincorporate pertinent citations in this biographical bibliography. Reading through the *Times* citations alone in *The Grand Canon* is divertingly informative.

to the biography of Grand Canyon's employees and residents. To omit notice of these people in these resources would weaken the focused purpose and utility of this work.

- 1. Pertinent, chapter-arranged biographical content of three titles have been excerpted for citations in the present biographical bibliography: 1) *River Runners of the Grand Canyon* by David Lavender (Grand Canyon Natural History Association, Grand Canyon [paperbound ed.], and University of Arizona Press, Tucson [clothbound ed.], 1985); 2) *From Powell To Power* by Otis Reed "Dock" Marston (Tom Martin, ed.) (Vishnu Temple Press, Flagstaff, 2014); and 3) *The Rapids and the Roar* by Gaylord Staveley (Fretwater Press, Flagstaff, 2015).
- 2. Cross-references to photographs and biographical sketches of many of the people interred in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery (and other gravesites in the area), and people who might be mentioned with them, are made to two publications: 1) *In a Better Place: Cemeteries and Gravesites of Grand Canyon* by Kern Nuttall (Vishnu Temple Press, Flagstaff, 2016); and 2) *Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery* by Parker Anderson (Acadia Publishing, Charleston, South Carolina, 2015; Images of America series). The first of these titles is particularly useful, in that it includes brief biographical sketches which have not been published elsewhere. However, not every individual noted in these two publications are cited. For example, infant burials and certain people not directly connected to Grand Canyon or activities there are omitted herein.

A third group of miscellaneous inclusions in this bio-bibliography pertains to pictorial records, so selected because they are easily accessible and (in 2024) are still in print. These are a series of publications in the "Images of America" series produced by Arcadia Publishing, each volume composed almost exclusively of photographs and legends for them. The books chosen for selected notices of individuals illustrated therein (their contents actually include more than the titles suggest) are:

The Grand Canyon: Native People and Early Visitors by Kenneth Shields, Jr. (2000)

Grand Canyon's Tusayan Village by Patrick Whitehurst (2010)

Grand Canyon's Phantom Ranch by Robert W. Audretsch (2012)

Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery by Parker Anderson (2015)

Lake Mead by Erin Elizabeth Eichenberg (2015)

The Grand Canyon: Past and Present by Kevin S. Schindler (2024)

These publications, though, are by far not the only places in which most of the cited images can be found; but they have been chosen for their ready availability particularly to the general user.

To be a bit more helpful toward suggesting more broadly focused publications as source material, a separate section herein lists anthologies and similar compendia, each

of which will include many people, but too many and too widely scattered to split apart for listing in this bio-bibliography (see "Anthologies and historical overviews offering biographical information and perspectives" [pp. 35-69]).

IV.

For the most part, the information herein pertains to times when these people were at the canyon. For others, brief biographical notes open the accumulated baggage of their experiences and accomplishments that embraced times before and after their canyon visits. Although their Grand Canyon contact may have been a minor point of their lives, the compound biographical information places them in a broader historical context. For example, Winston Churchill was at the canyon during an American lecture tour while he was a Member of Parliament, long before his becoming Prime Minister, and his accompanying teenaged son, Randolph, would later in his life become a Member of Parliament and a journalist. In similar fashion it may be useful to know that any person who later became well known was ever at the canyon.

Taking note of all of the occupational and avocational callings or activities of a person during their life may be useful to those who wish to understand the number and kinds of people who are noted for each category (for which see more completely the Index). For those who are very prominent in Grand Canyon's own history, the publications that are cited may go a bit beyond their canyon or river work and activities; but in context these important works might be noticed as curiously absent if they were *not* cited.

While one may understand that numerous famous people have visited the Grand Canyon, notes about their visits are often made without providing sources of information. This volume helps to resolve that deficiency. Such visits are not limited to politicians or royalty but may include the likes of those who were filming television productions, which require administrative permitting and some security protection from enthusiastically curious bystanders (for example, see <u>The Brady Bunch</u> or <u>Oprah Winfrey</u>).

VIP visits such as those by world leaders are, oddly enough, not always easy to track in the published literature. The reports may be relegated only to newspaper records, and among the papers not local to the Grand Canyon the notices may appear simply as news notes that they were arriving or were en route to other destinations;

sometimes they may have made it into print because of local journalistic angles. However, some of these people did make it into mainstream serials, although they might be less remembered today. For example, France's <u>Marshal Foch</u>, military champion of World War I, was given the red carpet treatment across the nation shortly after the war, but he is overlooked in the world more than a century later. <u>Albert Einstein</u>, on the other hand, is one of the permanent icons, who for more than century has retained popular recognition.

VIPs may be only momentarily in the American news; their Grand Canyon visits may not have been worth mentioning in majority publications. For example, the following state visits, mostly from the early post-World War II period, are recorded by the U.S. Department of State's Office of the Historian (informal visits are not recorded in the lists). Those who did visit Grand Canyon during state visits are (the dates embrace the entire period of the American visit): Abdul Ilah (Abd al-llah of Hejaz), Crown Prince (or Regent) of Iraq (June 1945); Mohammed Raza Pahlavi, Shah of Iran (November 1949); U.Nu, Prime Minister of Burma (Myanmar) (July 1955); Sukarno (né Koesno Sosrodihardjo), President of Indonesia (May 1956); Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy, Prime Minister of Pakistan (June 1957); and Karl Carstens, President of the Federal Republic of Germany (October 1983). Only the visits by the Shah and by Carstens appear in the present bio-bibliography because their visits were noted in published accounts other than newspapers, although Sukarno is listed because he appears only in one of the easily obtained volumes (noted above) chosen for their pictorial content.²⁰

Also included herein are numerous individuals whose activities are of transient interest, who would be forgotten except for contemporary notices that appeared sometimes in small print amidst many more news items. In job-related specialist serials or personal memoirs, these brief or folksy notes were meant to be of general and passing interest to a limited or select readership—for example, <u>Sidney Benedito</u>, the overshadowed second manager of the El Tovar Hotel who succeeded the long-serving and

²⁰ What still is needed is a fully researched—and documented—publication that takes advantage of the unpublished records, newspapers, and similar sources to finally, in one place, assemble the names, dates, and pertinent comments about the visits of all notable individuals. For example, the Grand Canyon National Park Museum Collection does have files pertaining to individuals noted to have been at Grand Canyon, but as useful as these records are, the files are not easily accessible by general users nor do they contain the same documentary bibliographical focus as that presented in this volume; and not all of them record their original sources. Surely many people in those files are not represented in this bio-bibliography, but on the other hand there are some on these pages who are not included in the museum files. The more in-depth publication called for must be a project for another compiler (or several) with the time and resources to carry it out.

widely remembered <u>Charlie Brant</u>, or <u>Royal King Starkweather</u>, who was called from Ash Fork to fill in for Mr. Brant who was on holiday to the Orient; or <u>Earl Clevenger and Anna Hahn</u>, who while working at El Tovar under Brant as chief clerk and office cashier, respectively, struck up a romance and resigned to go off in marriage.

It stands to reason that, while these brief newsy items may not be considered "significant" in the history of the Grand Canyon and Colorado River, they are worth documenting. This is because, first, they appeared at all in the published record, even if cursorily; and second, although the people there mentioned may have been "only" in service positions with Grand Canyon's commercial concessionaires, they still played enough of a role to be given notice by superiors and editors. These incidental notes may also be useful to genealogists as well as to the professional and avocational historians.

Some of these "little" people will be absolutely unknown to Grand Canyon historians and aficionados. For example, who would ever have known of "Hop", the Chinese cook of uncertain proper name who was remembered by author Hildegarde Hawthorne from the days before El Tovar; Ernest Moeri, a chef for just three months at El Tovar in 1918; or a century later, Meiyu Zhang's work-study stint in the food court at Maswik Lodge, a short distance from where Hop had labored. Hers was a commonplace job, too, not in the more decorous and refined El Tovar but important to the more mainstream customer services and concessionaire operations that she was learning. And unlike hundreds more workers over the years who went unrecorded, 21 Zhang wrote a brief report (in Chinese) of her experience for her Taiwanese sponsor's newsletter. (But not everyone has been enamored by the efforts of people like these. Craig Claiborne, Food Editor for *The New York Times*, wrote a blistering review in 1965 of the fare served to him at Bright Angel Lodge.)

Such people as these would not be known in Grand Canyon history were they not captured in this bio-bibliography. Every person, regardless of fame or social or occupational position, is integral to a unified history of the canyon and river.

Such as Charles Greifenstein, who appears in this bio-bibliography through this footnote; nothing has previously been published about his Grand Canyon connection. He, as Associate Librarian and Curator of Manuscripts (now Emeritus) at the American Philosophical Society in Philadelphia, was my immediate supervisor there. In 2018, on the occasion of my retirement as Reference Archivist, he presented me with an El Tovar menu from 1981–1982 that he had kept as a memento of the time when he worked there as a full-time waiter. At least this footnote in some fashion now preserves a record of another El Tovar "Charlie" as part of Grand Canyon's employee roll, as

well as serving as an association note with this bibliographer.

Notices of specific information are occasionally gleaned from the decennial U.S. Censuses and other public records like voter registrations (many of which are accessible online through Ancestry.com, https://www.ancestry.com/) and from the invaluable "Find a Grave" website (https://www.findagrave.com/), which may supplement or amplify information that appears in the published material cited herein. One might wonder why the censuses (in particular) are not relied upon as complete registers of everyone at Grand Canyon village and nearby (some early registrations also note residencies elsewhere along the rim and along the railroad between Williams and Grand Canyon). While it would be possible to list a great many more people from these records, doing so would provide very little information, other than occupations, that would be pertinent to this bio-bibliography. Using such records also runs the risk of unwittingly adopting information that is in error and which not all of it can be checked.²² Such a condensed reference work based on the censuses, properly researched and annotated, would best be done separately.

So, the citations herein provide referable documentation for visits or goings-on that may otherwise be known only by hearsay or from undocumented repetitions of previously published statements (perhaps themselves not documented). They also gather into one place many dispersed items that by themselves might be familiar. And the cited works can be found, somewhere. Since these are traditional publications produced in numerous identical copies, they can be obtained in libraires or online, though admittedly some are scarce. Unfortunately, other facsimile reproductions that were found online might be gone by the time they are looked for again.²³ For items that may be in libraries, there are online resources like WorldCat that can identify some of those repositories, if they are not first known to the user.²⁴

Those who have delved into genealogical research are likely to have met introduced errors, the result of mistakenly provided data and inattentive recording. Some misrecorded data will be noticed by individuals who are familiar with specific family lineages but which would not be known to other users of these data. Other data might be discerned by a careful comparison of the registration of the same person from one census to the next; for example, ages may be arithmetically off between census records, or other personal information such as place of birth or year of immigrartion may be different despite perspicacious assurances by the reader that they do in fact record the same person. (I myself even have encountered badly incorrect names for some people.)

A journey through these pages will be much like the expedition that rambles from charted territory into unfamiliar landscapes; or to make the obvious comparison, the traipsing off the rim or up from the river into the "real" Grand Canyon. Here in these pages we travel with those who have simply "been at" the canyon or who have "gone down" its river; then we may follow the folks who have roamed through the vast spaces of the inner canyon, soared far over (sometimes into) the canyon in aircraft or dressed only in what can only be described as "flying clothes," flung themselves across or into side canyons on motorcycles or skateboards, stepped gingerly across a precariously strung high wire, or who have roamed and wriggled deep underground in the canyon's hidden speleolands. Yet even though not everything can be read in this first biographical bibliography, the comprehension that there is far more is sure to entice new ventures.

Colorado River explorer and geologist John Wesley Powell contemplatively wrote,

I climb so high that the men and boats are lost in the black depths below, and the dashing river is a rippling brook; and still there is more cañon above than below. All about me are interesting geological records. The book is open, and I can read as I run. $[\ldots]$ One might imagine that this was intended for the library of the gods \ldots 25

Powell never realized what a great library would grow from his journeys—thousands of elaborate narratives and unadorned accounts alike, by and about people who have experienced the Colorado River and its Grand Canyon either from time immemorial or simply during the past five centuries. Only a relative few actually are represented in this volume, though we rely herein only on the easily documented, fairly easily refound, published records. These enamored visitors (and a few indifferent ones) may yet be too numerous to name. •

Edited from the Preface

This book compiles an edited series of transcriptions (some of them translated from other languages) of the Grand Canyon visits that have come down to us between 1540 and 1926. It differs from a more comprehensive bibliography, *The Grand Canyon!* (see below), in that the page layout is easier to read and it omits the transcriptions from non-English originals that do appear (with the translations) in *The Grand Canyon!*

The cut-off date of 1926 is not arbitrary, but reflects the fact that the publications to that year are now in the public domain; if they had had any copyright protection, it has lapsed. But 1926 also represents the earliest time when the Grand Canyon was one of the United States' new national parks, which in itself meant that even more people were drawn to visit the chasm. Visitorship had been ramping up under the prolifically successful advertising campaign of the Santa Fe Railway, which for decades had been enticing its ridership to stop by the canyon—if indeed it was not the principal destination. The railroad drummed it into the collective consciousness of Americans of every traveling caste, whether they were aboard parlor cars and upper berths, or among the steerage class of those who bought only a seat. Even so, some of the early visitors arrived on their own, overland; and if they published anything about their experiences, it is also here.

The first world war encouraged Americans to "See America First" (a phrase originated by the writer Charles F. Lummis, who also had something to say about the Grand Canyon). The second world

war dramatically reduced visitorship (everywhere), but afterward—oh, what a change. And Americans (and foreign travelers) never looked back. They, too, have had a lot to say about the Grand Canyon, which is far beyond the scope of the present volume.

Here I quote from early visitors' encounters with the Grand Canyon. If they had little to say, well and good, but those who gushed at length have had to be accommodated as well. Most were enthusiastic, as we might hope they would be, but there were a few who groused of their experience. They are all part of one story, a compilation of which has never before been made. There are anthologies, of course, that delve into a few of the works cited herein, but often even they curtail some of the additional interesting remarks that the writers had made. But I have no intention of replicating every word that they have written—especially those of the pioneer chroniclers, Balduin Möllhausen, Joseph C. Ives, John Wesley Powell, and Clarence E. Dutton in particular, who wrote entire books. I instead have had to arrange a transcript of worthwhile parts of their texts, which deliver specifically personal observations of their encounters with the Grand Canyon, going further than many of the time-honored (perhaps worn-out) series of quotations, although for comprehensiveness I must also embrace those exhausted scripts.

Beyond the luminaries, many if not most of the writers quoted here will be unknown; or perhaps just forgotten in the passage of years. Some were brief; others elaborated at such great length that the more essential accounts of their experiences had to be culled from even longer texts. They report observations, but better yet many of them go into personal reflections. Those who wrote in languages other than English are translated here, usually for the first time.

The writers often repeat what all the others said; it seems to be an affliction of writing about the Grand Canyon. Originality is at a premium. Yet, they bound along the canyon's rim, and into the canyon, pointing and grasping and gasping. But they repeat. I confess that in the process of making some pleasant success in editing through these repetitive observations, I was myself beset by architectural and chromatic fatigue, to the point that I thought it might be prudent to wash all such reflections from this book. But then, what would be point? It wouldn't be a book of experiences of encounters with the Grand Canyon. So I became more tolerant, more judicious about how to allow the same things to be said. If we allow Clarence Dutton the luxury of being the first master of Grand Canyon scenic metaphor, all the rest are simply followers. Certainly, this impression is unkind to the followers, but the cycle does in fact continue once the reading and writing tourists arrived at the canyon.

Despite the tedium of reexpression that one will encounter in this book, each of the hundreds of people quoted herein had taken the time to put their experiences on paper. A lot of them were indeed original, each in their own way; and a few were honest enough to credit any quotations they made. Some were very good at crafting their narratives; a few are stellar examples. And others, well, read on and discover them, too . . .



Edited from the Introduction

The Grand Canyon! is all about being at and interacting with the Grand Canyon.

So much has been written about the Grand Canyon from personal experience that it may be surprising that a comprehensive record of these impressions has never been put together. Never has every reference been compiled —nor for that matter have so many items been forgotten from the very time they were published. Yes, there are bibliographies, but most of them are specialized or embrace the tremendous hail of everything that goes beyond personal records and impressions. The Grand Canyon! cites, quotes, and annotates the published records of personal encounters with the Grand Canyon, or accounts told on behalf of those who were there, from 1540 to 2022. Up through 1926—the period in which publications are now in the public domain—extensive quotations (and where required, translations)—are provided; after that time, annotations are appended to citations.

True, a number of items have been reprinted in whole or in part in anthologies and similar volumes of prepared reprintings, but they are selective; some repeat the "same old" things. Beyond that, seemingly innumerable writers have quoted the "same old" passages from "A-list" writers like John Wesley Powell and Joseph C. Ives, even though Powell, Ives, and the others had many more interesting things to say beyond those quotations. This volume has to use these standard works, too. But it goes far beyond them, gathering up things that have been forgotten or effectively never known. As for "B-list" writers (and lower), some of them probably should remain forgotten—for their unstimulated perceptions or tortured prose and verse—but this is not a work of critical analysis. Here is everything, as much as could be found, each someone's personal experience, lavish and cursory alike, each a part of the Grand Canyon story, take it or leave it. Some things were published in languages other than English, which of course hid their discovery at least among readers of English. As many of these as possible have been found, too; and they are reprinted in their original languages and in English translation herein. To have subjectively edited out the "less worthy" or "overly wordy" publications, or those that simply are not in English, would dismiss the very administrative purpose of this volume—to document the world's infatuation with—its "use" of—the Grand Canyon.

This volume documents what is otherwise understood only by intuition or supposition—that the Grand Canyon is an intensely attractive draw, and people have "used" its resources intensely. This volume goes beyond prose, gathering up the works of poets and the publications that record the work

of artists, photographers, musicians, cinematographers, and architects—all of those people who have used their crafts to express their impressions of the canyon. And it has seemed logical to split the main part of this volume into the two principal Grand Canyon venues—arriving and seeing it from the rim and on its trails, and experiencing it along the Colorado River.

Edited from the Introduction

Art of the Grand Canyon does not comprise an inventory of all published Grand Canyon artwork.

The annotated bibliography in this volume gathers citations for publications, beginning in 1853, that in some way mention or illustrate the work of Grand Canyon artists between 1851 and 2023. It serves as a documentary effort that confirms the breadth and depth of artistic interest in the Grand Canyon. It also introduces numerous artists who have not had the privilege of being "recognized," such as those whose work was contributed "on the fly" to various journals and magazines, who are not acclaimed artists in their own right.

There seems to be no end to artists' interest in an admittedly challenging subject—the canyon—and the appearances of these works in magazines and books, whether only by mention or illustration, maintains a steady pace. There are many "Grand Canyon art books," too. One has only to look at the front matter or specific chapters within them to find information about, and examples of, the work of renowned Grand Canyon artists—for example, Thomas Moran from

the "old school," Bruce Aiken from the present, and Gunnar Widforss in between—all of them as different in concept, media, and perspective as there are moods of the canyon itself.

The Grand Canyon has been the subject of art since 1851, when the North Rim was first glimpsed and drawn from a distance of some sixty miles by an expedition-attached artist, Richard Kern. The main body of the canyon did not become the subject until 1858, at the hands of two more expedition-attached artists, Balduin Möllhausen and Friedrich Wilhelm von Egloffstein. Truly expressionist works featuring the canyon, and places in and around there, finally were produced by Thomas Moran and others, in the early 1870s, although many of Moran's first Grand Canyon works were commissioned products to illustrate John Wesley Powell's various articles and reports about his Colorado River expeditions and topographical surveys of the lands thereabout.

Moran, regaled as the premier Grand Canyon expressionist artist, first arrived there in 1873 on the North Rim with the Powell survey, where he saw the canyon at some of its most spectacular viewpoints. He moodily, and sometimes overimaginatively, delineated various scenes for Powell's work, occasionally basing his images on, or assisted by, expedition photographs (especially for places he had not been himself), which were transformed into woodcuts and lithographs. He also produced many paintings of the canyon for his own, and he continued to return to the canyon well into the twentieth century. Sometimes, he even modified older paintings to reflect his newer impressions of the subject. His Grand Canyon efforts had been launched suddenly into public and partisan renown when in 1874 the U.S. Congress authorized a \$10,000 payment to Moran—more than a quarter of a million dollars in 2023—for *The Chasm of the Colorado* (cover and frontispiece in *Art of the Grand Canyon*), a 7-by-12-foot masterpiece that was hung in the U.S. Capitol with its companion, the year-old ten-thousand dollar piece, *The Grand Cañon of the Yellowstone*. Legions have since tried to present Arizona's Grand Canyon on canvas and paper, even with less usual media like fabric, clay, glass, and metal; many with resounding critical success, others not so much.

For Grand Canyon artists, the twentieth century began as vigorously as the nineteenth had ended, partly due to the longevity of the master, Moran. Photographic picture books, however, began to displace less easily accessed gallery-meant paper and canvas portrayals of the canyon. "Parlor travelers" were consumers now. And the actual traveling public was targeted, too, with text and photo books turned out in the tens of thousands by the Santa Fe Railway, luring readers with the ease of rail access right to its South Rim accommodations. Later, the Union Pacific Railroad promoted longer (bus-connected) links from Utah to its lone North Rim property. At the South Rim, photo books were produced by the pioneer tourist business, Verkamp's. Not far from that busy place was the photography business of Kolb Bros. that briefly published photo books to complement their monopoly on trail-ride line-up photos. Then there was *Through the Grand Canyon from Wyoming to Mexico* (Macmillan, New York, 1914), the long-in-print book by Ellsworth Kolb (and sold and signed by the thousands by Emery throughout his life right from the Kolb Studio); the adventures were illustrated by views of the wild scenery and derring-do of their solo movie-filming expedition down the Green and Colorado Rivers in 1911–1912.

Displaced as the artists were, they continued to arrive at the Grand Canyon, painting and drawing their ways into the collections of art aficionados and museums. One has only to browse

through the *Art of the Grand Canyon* to witness the comings and goings of some of them. It was not until later in the twentieth century that artists again began to be prominent on the canyon's rims and in its depths. In 2009, the Grand Canyon Association (now the Grand Canyon Conservancy) began its annual "Grand Canyon Celebration of Art" exhibition and sale, attracting artists widely; and they sponsor as well the Grand Canyon National Park's program of Artists in Residence, which embraces more forms of creativity than just those that are pictorial.

With the twentieth century's artists have come more ambitious styles of expression. Perhaps the greatest of Grand Canyon's watercolorists was the Swede, Gunnar Widforss, who just about inhabited the canyon at times during his life, even dying suddenly while driving his car near El Tovar on what ironically was to be his last canyon trip, in 1934, limited by the health concerns of working at the high altitude of the rims. (He was buried there, in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery.) One has only to compare the likes of Widforss to the late-century's Bruce Aiken, Ed Mell, or David Hockney to begin to appreciate these later artists' vigorously new creations and the media they employ. And there are lots more, too, as one may gauge by the bibliography in *Art of the Grand Canyon*. Many of them of course deserve their own in-depth studies, which surely will come. Widforss and Aiken have seen successful appreciations in books and exhibits devoted to them (Widforss is also the sole subject of Alan Petersen's very ambitious gathering, the *Gunnar Widforss Catalogue Raisonné Project*), and Hockney's works have rounded the globe in successful exhibitions.

Edited from the Introduction

View Finders does not comprise an inventory of all published Grand Canyon photographs.

Particularly for noted and frequently published photographers, not every one of their works that appeared in magazines and books can realistically be cited because hundreds of their photographs were borrowed to illustrate items by others. What is cited in View Finders are publications of their work that is shown as separately acknowledged photographs as part of special features and portfolios of photographic work, or used as cover art even if it is without relation to any particular item within the publication. See (only as a few selected examples) works

cited for the prolific Southwest photographers Dick Dietrich, Jack Dykinga, Carlos Elmer, and the several members of the Muench family.

It stands to reason, too, that most articles and books about the Grand Canyon, the Colorado River, or the Southwest will have some illustrations of the Grand Canyon. While photographs therein may be credited somewhere in the publication (whether alongside or on separate pages), many are not, and it has not been practical to track each and every such photograph for this bibliography. In any case, the bibliography focuses on articles and entire publications devoted to subjects that embrace Grand Canyon photography and on credited standalone photographs. Some judicious editing, too, allows some citations to be added, if the photos offer some unusual aspect or composition.

Photographs that appear as illustrative material in commercial companies' catalogues, or illustrative filler in other publications, are cited only if the photographer is credited. These must be considered random contributions to the photobibliography.

In *View Finders*' photobibliography there are many citations for books that do not appear in the separate bibliography arranged by photographer (Part 2 of Volume 1) because, while sometimes individual photographs are cited from those books in Part 1, the photographers were not credited. Included in the photobibliography are publications with broader scopes—for example, subjects like "photographers of the old West"—which while they surely include some of the photographers cited in the volume, they cannot be conveniently compiled to the level of individual photographers.

- ✓ Years of birth and/or death are given where they have been determined through public records, if the dates did not appear in the cited publications. No dates are calculated (for example, from a stated age at time of death, which calculation could be numerically off by a year, more or less).
- ✓ Occupations and other indications of personal identity are provided, some of which for informational purposes may go beyond the times when these people were at Grand Canyon. Some of this information has been obtained through public and genealogical records. For convenience the term "concessionaire" is applied to hotel and other non-governmental services even before the time of formal contractual arrangements, prior to the creation of the national park.
- ✓ The term "river runner" has been used uniformly for all people who have boated the Colorado River, whether as tourist passengers, avocationally (on private trips) or professionally (who are collectively "boatmen", even by general consensus and preference the women). It also would have been awkward to label John Wesley Powell a boatman, who, despite his accomplishments, did not row a boat.

Numerous other individual animals have been noticed casually in publications but are not collated here. Most of these were mules; usually they were the writer's riding mount during a trip into the canyon. For example, Joe Mitchell Chapple (1906) reported that he rode on Midnight; H. Nelson Orr (1910) recited the names of all of the mules for their cross-canyon trip to the Arizona Strip—Peanuts (Orr's mount, which he nicknamed Hellen Damnation), Joe, Jack, Jock, Murphy, Davy, Casey, and Trouble; and Howard Vincent O'Brien (1934) had select comments about his mount, Granite. There also were Bob and Flo, who carried Sweden's Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf and Crown Princess Louise across the canyon. The mules who are listed for special entries (above) were the subjects of experiences, happenings, books, well known photos, or even legal cases.

He also "drove a bus on the route between Williams and the Canyon, and afterwards, became a popular tour guide."

Kern Nuttall (<u>In a Better Place</u> 2016, p. 212), in the biographical entry for Charles Lamb Horning, remarked that Charles's son Pat recalled that "John Wayne turned up one night at the Horning home for one of the notorious poker sessions, along with the local legend, Jake Barranca. Even at a young age, Pat vividly remembered that Wayne had huge hands but that Jake's were even bigger." (No further notes.)

While Solomon Barth is not known to have actually been at Grand Canyon, his story touches in an interesting though putative way on canyon history, thus he is accorded this entry here. Among the citations below, the claim was simply repeated without further documentation; a predicament that, as outlined in the Introduction herein, inspired the creation of this bio-bibliography. Even so, it seems to be based on family history, probably.

Barth was a Polish/Prussian immigrant of Jewish descent who traded, freighted and gambled his way through Arizona during the latter half of the nineteenth century. He served two years as a convict in the infamous Yuma Territorial Prison after having been sentenced in 1887 to serve ten years for mishandling public records and forgery, but was pardoned. He supposedly acquired the Grand Canyon in a trade with Navajo Indians in the 1860s. Although a brief scholarly biography of Barth²⁹ takes no notice of this, read some meager, second-hand bits and pieces in the publications listed below. Although the one by Sol's great-grandson, Charles B. Wolf, seems to hold promise for documentary evidence in its brief Chapter 2—"1860s: Sol 'Owns' the Grand Canyon"—it does little to provide information. The chapter title is based solely on a couple of comments, perhaps just parts of family tradition. Sol is said to have had grazing and trading rights through a "formal treaty" with the Navajo along the Little Colorado River, "all the way to the Grand Canyon." Wolf declares, without any elaboration or source, "At some point, Sol sold some of the south rim of the Grand Canyon to the Santa Fe Railroad," which should be an easy thing to substantiate in Santa Fe and county records, but after this

remark Wolf proceeds straight to a concluding paragraph about Sol's birthplace. Note the paucity of concrete information even in the Santa Fe Railway's obituary notice for Barth (Anonymous, 1929).

A most peculiar association—an embellished narrative of a trail trip into Grand Canyon, illustrated with stock Santa Fe photos of Grand Canyon scenery, published in the Santa Fe's own serial, yet it describes a trip on the trails of the railway's hotelier arch nemesis, William Wallace Bass, whose guests often crossed the Colorado River to reach Shinumo Camp up Shinumo Creek on the north side. The trip is fraught with danger, including a storm and flash flood while along the creek, and an account of the precarious return across the river and up to the South Rim on a washed out trail. Bass is not mentioned by name—except pointedly to the geographic feature, "Bass Tomb". Clearly this was a Santa Fe-produced item to discredit Bass. Incidentally, at this very time the railroad had torn up the platform at the Bass Station flag stop on the Grand Canyon Railway (see Orr herein), a few miles short of the terminus at Grand Canyon village, where Bass would receive his guests and take them to Bass Camp farther west.

Although they paid two state visits to the U.S., in June 1960 and 1967 (U.S. Embassy to Thailand, https://th.usembassy.gov/our-relationship/king-bhumibol-adulyadej-u-s-enduring-friendship/; accessed 20 June 2024), it is noted that on the 1960 visit they had gone to California among other places, and on the 1967 visit they remained in the Northeast. Else, why all these wonders, this surpassing beauty, this grandeur, this deep peace, this confident repose? No, here is the spirit of God, here one must believe."

The ride on horseback down the trail to the Colorado river is a bit strenous, but rich in experience. [¶] Our stay was all too short, but we made many resolutions to go again and stay indefinitely. The beauty and comfort of El Tovar Hotel is well known to the tourist." (The "inferno" quotation is from C. A. Higgins, *The Grand Cañon of the Colorado River, Arizona* [Santa Fe Railway, various dates].)

He did not—or perhaps did not have to—mention that the "sermons in stones" are William Shakespeare's ("As You Like It", Act 2, Scene 1). He details what numerous others had already written. "[The sermons] not only testify to the omnipotence of the Creator but they record the story of a stream which both molds and is molded by its environment. It can not escape from the walls of its prison and yet it has made its impress upon the granite as, in obedience to the law of gravitation, it has gone dashing and foaming on its path to the sea. How like a human life! — The Colorado, pure and clear in the mountains, becomes a dark and muddy flood before it reaches the ocean, so contaminated is it by the soil through which it passes The river also teaches a sublime lesson of patience."

Address to the American Peace Society. Concludes with remarks on his visit with his wife to Grand Canyon, as a generic parable: "It takes the work of all to accomplish the total result. Incursionists; Grand Canyon visitors (1540); Coronado Expedition

During the 1539–1542 entrada led by **Francisco Vásquez de Coronado** (1510–1554, Governor of New Galicia, New Spain), a visit to Grand Canyon was made in 1540 by a small party commanded by **García López de Cárdenas**, which was dispatched from the main force in the pueblo country. The entrada is known mostly through the account recorded years later by **Pedro de Castañeda de Nájera** (or Pedro de Nájera, 1515–1570), which is the more elaborate rendition of two known accounts. Castañeda's version, originally written in Mexico (Nueva España) in the 1560s, and known to us now only through a copy that was made in 1596 in Seville, Spain, was not published until 1838 (in French translation) and 1896 (in the original Spanish and in English translation) (see citations below). The other rendition is a much shorter, anonymous record that was not published until 1857 (in Spanish, see below). The party, the first non-Indigenous people known to have reached the Grand Canyon, was investigating a report that a large river was supposed to be to the west of the army. They had been led to the canyon by Hopi guides, though the precise location at which they arrived there has been the subject of much study and conjecture; it was somewhere along the southeastern rim of the canyon. The river was of interest because Coronado's force had originally planned to be in contact with boats that would ascend the Río Colorado from the Sea of Cortés (Gulf of California), which obviously was not a realistic plan.

The three men who are the subject of this enumerated entry are the only ones of Cárdenas's excursion to the Grand Canyon whose names are recorded by the chronicler, Castañeda. Pablo de Melgosa and Juan Galeras were two of the three men (the third one's name was not remembered) who attempted, but failed, to reach the Colorado River from the rim of the canyon. As such, Melgosa and Galeras are the earliest known non-Indigenous people to enter the Grand Canyon. (Biographical data garnered from Richard Flint and Shirley Cushing Flint (eds., translators, annotators), *Documents of the Coronado expedition*, 1539-1542: "they were not familiar with His Majesty, nor did they wish to be his subjects" [Southern Methodist University Press, Dallas, Texas, 2005]. See also the companion digital project online at https://coronado.unm.edu/; last accessed 22 June 2024.)

Coronado and Castañeda are sometimes mistakenly indicated to have been to the Grand Canyon. As noted above, Coronado was the commander of the main incursionary force from New Spain, and Castañeda, who accompanied the army, was the later chronicler of the expedition; neither were on Cárdenas's investigatory expedition to the west of the army's main course.

Another man of the Coronado *entrada* whose name is associated with the Grand Canyon is **Pedro de Tovar** (*ca.* 1518–between 1583–1589), a captain and encomendero who was also present at the Hopi mesas. Of course his name is recognized today as that given in the early 20th century to El Tovar, Grand Canyon's flagship hotel, even though he was never at the canyon. His age in 1540 is indicated by the Flints to be 22, while some online records indicate his birth to be in 1501 (the Flints' record is more reliable). Because of the contemporary interchange of the consonants *b* and *v* in early Spanish documents (the Flints take note of this on p. 14 in their section on "Translation and Transcription Protocols"), Tovar's name has sometimes been transcribed as Tobar, but the Flints consistently transcribe his name as Tovar though with a typographical device that indicates that *b* might be substituted. There is a perhaps apocryphal statement that the hotel's name was originally planned to use the Tobar spelling, but that it was deemed that signage could thus mislead visitors "To bar"!

The letter stated they had spent \$3,760 more than agreed upon and they wanted to know if he would not send a check for the additional amount. When I had read it, Mr. Carnegie looked up and with a twinkle in his eye said, 'How about it? The decision is in your hands.' I said, 'Have your secretary make out a check for the amount and send it to them. You can't take your money with you—it would burn up.' He gave me an amused and quizzical look and said, 'I'll send the check, but I want you to understand that I don't expect to go where you think I am going.'"

Also notes the following (pp. 24-25), quoting Brant: "One evening **Mr. Carnegie**, Edwin Gould and Mrs. Russell Sage were having dinner together. Mr. Carnegie called me over and said, 'How much water do you use here a day, and what does it cost you?' I told him we hauled all the water a distance of 127 miles and that we used about 45,000 gallons a day. Mrs. Sage was surprised to learn that we had to haul all our water. There were in fact different types and cateogories of the Leopold II medal, depending upon the circumstances and the social, military, or political position of the recipient. Like most of these medals, Smith's was mailed to him by the army. It is likely that Cochran's medal differed somewhat from this one.

At the time when Ensor registered for the World War I draft in 1918 he was a machinist for the Heinz Motor Co., Baltimore, Maryland; at the time of the 1920 U.S. Census he worked for a taxicab company in Baltimore; in the 1930 U.S. Census he was doing "trail work" for the Park Service at Grand Canyon; and in the 1940 and 1950 U.S. Censuses he was living at

Grand Canyon. In 1940 he was a Park Service caretaker and it is noted there that he had an 8th grade education; in 1950 he was a janitor for the Babbitts store. When he registered for the World War II draft in 1942 it was noted that he had a broken right ankle. He was still at Grand Canyon when the 1952 Arizona voter registration sheets were prepared. He was born in Butler, Baltimore County, Maryland, and is buried in Sparks, Baltimore County.

"Leaving Kingman at 8.12 on Friday morning, April 18, both planes flew into the Grand Canyon, entering at Diamond Creek and flying north and east to a place known as Supai Falls" [Ervin's report includes comments that a ground party went to the mouth of Diamond Creek to lay out a location marker in the form of a "T" made of cheese-cloth.] ". . . at 8.45 A.M. on Saturday, April 19, both planes took off and again flew to the entrance at Diamond Creek, where they located the 'T' displayed by Mr. Bockhurst, and descended to an altitude of 3100 feet, approximately 1200 feet above the river. At this point there is a pinnacle [Diamond Peak] that was evidently formed by the entrance of Diamond Creek and Peach Springs Stream [sic] entering the Colorado River, and an effort was made by both planes to use this as a vantage point for Mr. Bockhurst to make pictures of the planes coming around this peak, flying into [sic] the Colorado River. Approximately 25 minutes were spent at this work. [¶] On the return of Mr. Bockhurst it was discovered that . . . he was only able to obtain pictures of the planes with the sky as a background as he had to 'shoot' at such a high angle of elevation, but excellent pictures were obtained of the canyon itself, so this trip may be considered partially successful. "

In Grand Canyon history, Willis Evans is notable for his discovery in 1936 of Rampart Cave in westernmost Grand Canyon while working with the Civilian Conservation Corps. The discovery was well publicized even in the popular press. The cave, so well known for its trove of "ice age" animal and plant remains, was devastated by a presumably accidental fire in the 1970s by unknown

unauthorized visitors. Although after its discovery in the 1930s plans were made for public exhibits (visitors would reach it by way of guided tours that were then being conducted on the new Lake Mead), nothing came of them. No evidence of human occupation of the cave has been found.

The Marshal most fittingly described it as fantastic and unreal." (p. 312). The party was driven to various viewpoints along the rim. "The Marshal remarked that he had never heard of the Grand Canyon before I had entered it on his list as one of the necessary stops, and he feared that when he went away from the spot he would find it had been unreal—merely a dream. [¶] We went on further and while General Desticker, McNider, Roberts, D'Olier, Mackay, de Mierry, l'Hopital and others made the trip down one of the trails toward the 'bottom of the pit,' the rest of us went to the Hermit's Rest for a cup of tea and a quitet chat. A big log fire roared in the immense fire place and though the day had been bright and clear there was a frosty quality in it that caused us to enjoy the cosy room and delicious tea. The 'mule party' returned later on and we all found special vantage points from which to watch the glorious sunset." (p. 313).

(The book's author is Lt. Col. Francis Ernest Drake, U.S. Army, Past Commander of Department of France, American Legion, who accompanied Marshal Foch's party. Robert Frankel may or may not have worked at Grand Canyon; the only published canyon record is that while he worked for the Fred Harvey Indian Department he performed a daredevil stunt at the canyon.

The following biographical infomation has been compiled for this bio-bibliography. In 1915 (as reported in the Anonymous, 1917, item cited below) Frankel was "press agent for the Indian Village, the Santa Fe's attractive concession at the San Diego fair". When he registered for the World War I draft he was employed as a hotel clerk in Los Angeles. At the time of the 1920 U.S. Census he is listed as the manager of a "curio store" at the Hotel Del Monte in Monterey, California; in the 1930 and 1950 U.S. Censuses he operated a theater ticket brokerage, while at the time of the 1940 census he was a "Chastra Market" (Shasta Market?) worker, and he is recorded as having had an 8th grade education. When he registered for the World War II draft in 1942 he was self employed in the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel (perhaps his ticket brokerage). He was born in St. Louis, Missouri, and is buried in Hollywood, California.

[¶] We never counted just how many of these baby cañons Bob hurdled in the course of a morning's constitutional—because we were not of form sufficiently sylphlike to follow the nimble Robert—but we do know that, when there weren't sufficient cañons lying around to give him a succession of thrills, he took fiendish delight in jumping the same one a score or so of times."

(The observation is made, *here*, that given the fact that the photo appears in the January 1917 issue, and thus perhaps from 1916 at the latest, Frankel's stunt predates the leap made famous by Douglas Fairbanks later in 1917 while shooting the film, *A Modern Musketteer* [about which see pp. 38-44 in *View Finders: Volume 1*].)

"Tiki" never visited Grand Canyon. These citations are cited here for their background information that pertains to a journal written by Tiki, which was cached in the canyon by Charlotte Reid, Tiki's aunt, at Mile 114.0 Right; and as such the journal is beoming a persistent though small element of Grand Canyon history. It seems that the journal was stolen, but which may yet exist misplaced in another locale nearby. A replacement version was cached before August 1997. Regarding this see Peg Bartlett (1996, 2010). Reid's (1995) biography of Tiki includes a transcription of most of the journal (but does not mention Grand Canyon). Earle Spamer and Richard Quartaroli visited the site on August 23, 1997, when Spamer photographed the few pages of the replacement journal (note the discrepancy with a later date mentioned by Bartlett about when the replacement had been cached). In July 2023, Spamer digitally corrected his overexposed transparencies, and a digital file copy was given to and printed out by the Grand Canyon National Park Museum Collection. Bartlett also mentions that the replacement was in a piece of Tupperware; but Spamer and Quartaroli found it rolled up in a plastic water bottle, also photographed. The "letter" that Barlett mentions is actually a handwritten note on one of the computer-printed journal leaves.

Charlotte had compiled Tiki's words into a small handbound book and wanted to leave this journal in memory of Tiki somewhere in this Canyon that had moved her so much." "[In 1998] when I returned to the Canyon and the Inner Gorge, I had a new journal in a water-tight Tupperware ready to be placed in the same cave where so many years ago Peter Weiss had sent me to find the coffee can. To create a spirit similar to the original, I left a letter explaining why the new copy of the original journal was there, and the power of the accompanying notes that were now lost. I hoped this replacement would at least hold some of Tiki's legacy in the place her aunt had intended." Concludes with comments concerning the possible rediscovery of the original journal in a more remote location nearby, though Bartlett was unable to locate it. About Tiki, see Reid (1995).

Grand Canyon Historical Society

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The society was founded in Flagstaff, Arizona, in 1984 as the Grand Canyon Pioneers Society. In 2002 its name was changed to the Grand Canyon Historical Society. Its mission statement is: "The Grand Canyon Historical Society celebrates and promotes the study and preservation of the Grand Canyon region's cultural and natural history for the education and enjoyment of its members and the public." The society has hosted several major symposia on the history of Grand Canyon and supports historical and scholastic researchers through a program of grants. It publishes *The Ol' Pioneer*, which has grown to include many unusual topics of historical and biographical interest. The society also conducts a program of oral history interviews, transcripts and videos of which are deposited in the society's collections in the Special Collections and Archives, Cline Library, Northern Arizona University.

The society also presents two usually annual awards. The **Pioneer Award** is presented "to honor living individuals who have made a significant contribution to the understanding of, and knowledge about, the Grand Canyon of the Colorado River. The **Hall of Fame Award for Community Service** is presented by the society and the National Park Service "in recognition of those organizations and individuals who have selflessly contributed to the betterment of the Grand Canyon community over years past." This award is often awarded in a given year to selected deceased and living individuals. A plaque with the Hall of Fame recipients' names is in the Shrine of Ages at Grand Canyon. M., and next morning in an easy 'buckboard wagon' twenty-two miles and 4,000 feet descent into this wonderful cañon, a piece of it, which its explorer, Major Powell, has made famous. [¶] This afternoon and evening we are to get up and back, and on in the night and morning to Flagstaff, and the ancient cliff dwellings." (p. 771) [he did not make it to the cliff dwellings (Walnut Canyon)]. [¶] "May 8 [. . .] The cañon trip well repaid the journey and its rough accessories. Some of the views are those depicted by Powell. [...] From Mohave to the Colorado is very sandy and complete desert, descending eastward many hundred feet. Guevara Calderón of course never was at the Grand Canyon, but he is cited here for a record communicated by Ernesto Guevara Lynch (1900–1987), the father of Ernesto Guevara (more widely known as Che Guevara, 1928–1967, the Argentine Marxist revolutionary and guerilla leader). Lynch indicated that his grandfather inherited through marriage (to María Concepción Castro Peralta) the lands of Don Guillermo de Castro, which ostensibly included the Grand Canyon. This potential connection of "owernship" of the Grand Canyon by the Guevara family, with its obvious implication that Che Guevara could have "inherited" the canyon as well, is a postulation too curious and bibliographically too obscure to exclude from this bio-bibliography.

Some additional information (including the correct spelling of Neal's name and his life dates) is garnered (here) from Neal Guse Jr.'s Neptune Society obituary online (https://neptunesociety.com/obituaries/north-richland-hills-tx/neal-guse-11576955; accessed 28 May 2024). His father worked (in an unspecified capacity) at Grand Teton National Park, and Neal followed in his footsteps at Grand Teton until moving on to Rocky Mountain National Park as Park Ranger and later to Yosemite National Park as Wildlife Biologist to 1969, when he transferred to Grand Canyon. In 1972 he moved to the Department of the Interior in Washington, D.C., where in 1973 he became Chief, Natural Resources Management. He thereafter became Deputy Regional Director, Southeast

Region (1978–1984), and thereafter Superintendent, Mount Rainier National Park (1984–1992), thereafter becoming Director of the Clemson University Cooperative Park Studies Unit in Clemson, South Carolina, from which position he retired from the Park Service after 34 years. The obituary concludes, "A celebration of life will occur at the Grand Canyon National Park, AZ with details to be determined at a later date." At the time of his death, his wife, Carol, survived him.

Carrie Ann Guse is buried in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery.

Hansbrough drowned in the Colorado River at 25-Mile Rapid and his body was found a year later at Mile 43.8 Left during the regrouped Stanton Expedition. He is buried along a ledge against the cliff, where "PMH" is carved into the rock. The geographic feature later named Point Hansbrough overlooks the scene. Also drowned with Hansbrough, though his body was never recovered, was Henry Richards, an African-American—incidentally the first recorded Black man to have been both to the Grand Canyon and on the Colorado River—one of the two personal servants of Robert Brewster Stanton who accompanied the expedition. (Frank M. Brown, President of the Denver, Colorado Cañon & Pacific Railroad, was himself drowned shortly before Hansbrough; see Brown separately herein.) Refer to In a Better Place (Nuttall, 2016, pp. 27-28) for brief biographical notes and a photo of Colorado River historian Dock Marston at the Hansbrough grave with a film crew. Refer to Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery (Anderson, 2015, p. 118) for two photos and legends from an archaeological survey on February 21, 1997.

Quigley was a Boy Scout who drowned on June 26, 1951, 60 miles upstream in Glen Canyon; his body was discovered here by river runners on July 10 and buried upstream from the Hansbrough grave, marked by a circle of stones. A grave marker in the Minidoka Acequia Rupert Cemetery, Rupert, Idaho, with Quickley's name and dates, is a cenotaph memorial; associated information corroborates that the place of death was noted only as San Juan County, Utah. Refer to <u>In a Better Place</u> (Nuttall, 2016, pp. 28-29) for brief biographical notes and an early photo the Quigley grave. Refer to <u>Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery</u> (Anderson, 2015, p. 122) for photos and legends, one "probably mid-1950s", the other from 1956.

This site is at President Harding Rapid and camp, where during the 1923 U.S. Geological Survey expedition (see Birdseye Expedition herein) the crew laid over for a day to commemorate the funeral of Warren G. Harding, whose death had been heard about via radio earlier in the expedition.

The stories of both Hansbrough and Quigley, and less frequently Richards, are occasionally recounted in articles and books.

Surely the most engaging of the early promotional materials, by the man who was not surprisingly "in special charge of advertising" for the Santa Fe Railway. It was reprinted and extracted from by the Santa Fe for more than two decades afterward. Profusely artistic and poetic in his descriptions of the canyon's forms and moods, it really all comes down to: "There is but one Grand Canyon. Nowhere in the world has its like been found." It was in this publication that the well-reused term, "Titan of Chasms," originated (p. 4, mentioned only once), later freely borrowed by numerous authors, not the least of which is the Santa Fe Railway's own very popular sequel booklet, *Titan of Chasms* (see notation in the 1902 citation, below). Higgins is also the source for the lettering on the lintel of the canyon-side veranda of El Tovar Hotel (in italics below), which in its fuller context reads (p. 25), "Then darkness falls, and should there be a moon, the scene in part revives in silver light, a thousand spectral forms projected from inscrutable gloom; *dreams of mountains, as in their sleep they brood on things eternal.*"

The only operative annotation for this is that the booklet is the quintessential Santa Fe Railway publication about "its" Grand Canyon. The whole thing (and/or one of its later printings, which vary a bit) must be read through.

✓ There is also a separately produced booklet by The Santa Fe Passenger Department, *Titan of Chasms: the Grand Canyon of Arizona*, first produced in 1902 and thereafter in various printings, dates, pagination, and imprints, sometimes with no formal imprint, through the 1910s; and often that volume has been cited with Higgins as author.

Louise Hinchliffe arrived at Grand Canyon from Webster, Massachusetts, on Saturday, November 24, 1951, and began work as secretary in the Naturalists Workshop the following Monday. She filled the position vacated by Mrs. Ruby Chase who had moved to Tucson. In Massachusetts she had been editor of the *American Optical News* published by the American Optical Company. ("Grand Canyon", *Arizona Daily Sun* [Flagstaff], November 29, 1951, p. 2.) (At the time of the 1950 U.S. Census, Ruby Chase was listed as a Park Service "Clerk Stenographer" and Hubert Chase as a Park Service "Construction Engineer".

Hinchliffe is buried in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery; her grave marker is styled like an open book (see https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/194009001/louise-m-hinchliffe; accessed 23 July 2024). The party seems to have not to have spent longer than

There is a story told of a Chinaman who was employed as a cook at the station restaurant that was the only eating place at the Grand Cañon before the hotel was built on the rim.

Daily this Oriental observed quantities of people disembarking from the arriving trains, eating a hasty meal and clambering out of sight up the trail that led through the dust and under the scrubby

piñon pines over the shoulder of the hill. After a while they came back, ate another hasty meal, climbed aboard the waiting train and vanished.

At last he approached the manager for whom he worked:

"What for allee people go top-side allee time when get here?" he wanted to know.

"Haven't you ever gone up there, Hop?"

The Chinaman shook his head.

"Me vellee busy man," he replied.

"Well, you go up, and see for yourself," he was told.

He went. When, a long time afterwards, he came back, there was a wild look in his eye, though he had nothing to say. But he never missed a chance to climb top-side after that, and could be seen, sitting immovable on the terrific rim, whenever the work was slack enough to allow of his leaving.

(Hidegarde Hawthorne [1871–1952], who soon married John Milton Oskison, a part-Cherokee writer, editor, and journalist, was a writer and biographer well able to tell of past events. She was a granddaughter of American novelist and writer Nathaniel Hawthorne and the daughter of the novelist, writer, and journalist Julian Hawthorne.)

International Geological Congress (1891, 1932, 1989)

The International Geological Congress is a professional convocation of geologists that has been held somewhere in the world about every three to five years. The first congress was held in Paris in 1878.

Later International Geological Congresses that also convened in Washington, D.C., likewise included field trips to the Grand Canyon. These were the 16th (1932) and the 28th (1989), the latter of which offered the first Colorado River trips through the canyon.

Pertinent citations relating to some of the people who participated in these congresses, and guidebooks and memorial volumes, are cited below. 5th IGC (1891)

The 5th congress included an excursion to the Rocky Mountains that added a side trip from Denver to the Grand Canyon.

(Stainier's article includes the only known description of the stormy bivouac camp between Flagstaff and the canyon.)

The participants of this field trip detrained at Flagstaff, where John Wesley Powell met them for the sixty-mile wagon trip to the Grand Canyon. There they stayed at John Hance's rimside cabin and tent accommodations at Glendale Springs and traveled his trail to the Colorado River (the so-called Old Hance Trail in the Hance Creek side canyon, part of it wrecked by the elements soon afterward and barely a route today, replaced by the New Hance Trail in Red Canyon).

"Congress Canyon" is the canyon of Hance Creek, informally named by the members of the field trip. It is not an informal renaming of Red Canyon, as previously acknowledged in literature. The confusion arises from the fact that in 1895 John Hance's old trail was partly destroyed by the elements, and the New Hance Trail was built down Red Canyon, east of Hance Creek. The New Hance is an unmaintained wilderness trail; the Old Hance is a hazardous wilderness route, if anything, since virtually all trace of it is gone. "Congress Canyon" is not "opposite Point Sublime" but the reference was probably made due to the then-recently published monograph by Clarence E. Dutton (1882) that included the famous double-folio triptych illustrations of the view from Point Sublime.

This paper is a geological overview, but of interest are two lithographic illustrations accompanying it that were delineated by Henry Moubray Cadell of Grange, Boness, Scotland, which were added to Frech's scientific paper. These represent the first views of the interior of the eastern part of the Grand Canyon—the "grander" part, as

compared to the western sections where Balduin Möllhausen and F. W. von Egloffstein had been 33 years earlier. These lithographs are also reproduced on pp. 41 and 42 in <u>Art of the Grand Canyon</u>.

"He would not entitle it in the Faeroese 'Eg sang fryi eitt súrepli!' It would be just what he had told the other hikers, in English: 'I Sing You for an Apple!'" Jacobsen's memoir (1982, see above), in Faroese, was published with the title Brá úr USA.

Quartaroli *et al.*, from "Chop" hill and elsewhere in the San Francisco Peaks during Fall 2013, the scene depicted by Kern seems to be higher in elevation and on the west side of the San Francisco Peaks. Further investigations still are to be made; the onset of winter weather precluded continued work in 2013.

Tom Jonas and Andrew Wallace have likewise reinvestigated the vantage point of Kern's drawing. The locale seems to be on the western side of the San Francisco Peaks, as the twin hills in Kern's drawing are the White Horse Hills. The vantage point, at about 9100 ft elevation, seems now to have been obscured by trees, but Jonas and Wallace believe that the position has been identified within a few hundred feet. (*fide* Tom Jonas in correspondence, January 2015). [This revised information also appeared in Spamer (2022).]

Following is a purposely detailed example of the value of special collections, to illustrate what can be done in a further expansion of the present work.

I processed some of the papers of Luna Leopold that were given to the American Philosophical Society, in Philadelphia, where he was an elected member. I have had the unique opportunity to make this comparative examination of published *and* manuscript materials myself—a direct Grand Canyon and Colorado River connection with biographical undertones—thus this information is included for its benefit in biographically documenting Leopold's presence and activities in Grand Canyon beyond his few publications that touch upon the Grand Canyon's river.

Also present on the Grand Canyon river trip of 1964 were Luna's sister **Estella Bergere Leopold** (1927–2024, U.S. Geological Survey 1955-1976, University of Washington 1976-2000, paleobotanist, conservationist, and editor) and son **Bruce Carl Leopold** (1944–2016), later a psychiatrist.

Earle Spamer, Reference Archivist at the American Philosopical Society, processed what effectively are Leopold's retirement-period papers, 1986–2006, which comprise Leopold's years at the U.S. Geological Survey and at the

University of California at Berkeley but with a substantial amount of personal papers and photographic materials from his entire life. The provenance of these materials is: Gifts of Luna B. Leopold, 1988, 1991, 1992, 1995, 2003, 2005, 2006; Gift of the Estate of Luna B. Leopold, 2006; Gifts of Estella Leopold [daughter], 2015, 2016. More importantly, this collection also contains all of Leopold's personal illustrated journals and his field notes, and a large collection of original plane-table maps, which include his notable **Colorado River trip in Grand Canyon** in 1964. (See notes from the finding aid below for all details.)

Abstract from the finding aid: "Luna Bergère Leopold (1915-2006, APS 1972 [year of election]), son of prominent conservationist Aldo Leopold (1887-1948), worked during seven decades to bring the field of hydrology and fluvial geomorphology into the conscience of urban planners and those who would restructure the flow of rivers and streams. He established the first practical, major field methods by which the geometry of streams and the waterflow in them are measured and how these data are analyzed. His work is based on meticulous field studies over the course of a multifaceted career as a meteorologist, hydrologist, geomorphologist, professor, and conservationist. This collection comprises his extensive incoming correspondence and other papers mostly during his active retirement years (1986-2006), with some earlier papers. The collection also contains his profusely illustrated personal journal in 12 volumes (1931-2003) that include world travels; some 70 field notebooks (1937-2006) embracing localities in the Western and Northeastern United States, in Hawaii, and some foreign locations (chiefly in India and Israel); more than a hundred original plane table maps from locales in the United States; a significant set of correspondence and papers (1956-1986) from hydrologist and sedimentologist Ralph Alger Bagnold (1896-1990), who in his own right was a pioneer in modern sedimentology and hydrology; and publications and manuscripts over the course of Leopold's multidisciplined career."

From the background note: "In 1965 chiefly, Leopold also pioneered the application of his methodologies to large canyonbound rivers in the American West; specifically, the Green River and San Juan River in Utah, and the Colorado River in Utah and Arizona including Cataract Canyon, Marble Canyon, and the **Grand Canyon**. In the Grand Canyon he was the first to demonstrate the geomorphic genesis and evolution of the rapids and pools that memorably characterize this reach of the Colorado River. These were his only excursions into detailed field work on large rivers, but they are every bit as significant to the studies of such streams as are his studies of more modest streamways, the small rivers, creeks and arroyos for which he became so well known.

"More than 70 field notebooks (Series XI) and more than a hundred original plane-table maps (Series XIX) comprise the most significant parts of the Leopold papers in this collection, spanning a remarkable seven-decade field career, 1937-2003. They are vivid testimony to the development of Leopold's methods and ideologies.

"Luna Leopold compiled a personal 'Journal' (Series XII), heretofore unavailable to researchers, which may well be the most embracing picture of the man, his work, and thoughts. Eleven volumes, hand-bound by Leopold, and a twelfth volume in progress, tell his personal stories, work perspectives, and travelogues from 1931 to 2003, although the last two volumes of his 'Field Notes' (Series XI) also served to document some of his personal activities and thoughts from 2001 to the day before his death in 2006. The Journals are profusely illustrated with photographs and some hand-drawn sketches; even the occasional water-color painting. Extensive handwritten and typewritten texts detail adventures, observations, concerns, and ideas. The earliest of Leopold's Journals delightfully record an observant naturalist's eye, salting his pages with careful drawings of birds, and laying between the leaves of the book pressed plants and bird feathers. He dabbled in poetry, some of which appears in his Journals and Field Notes, as well as an unpublished small collection that he assembled in the 1990s. His Journals and Field Notes also contain diversions of musical lyrics (some of them original) and musical notations, usually for guitar.

"The Field Notes range from casual observations, through the gamut of meticulous pages of field measurements and readings, to postulations of cause and effect among substrates, vectors, and volumes. Hardly restricted to dreary, clinical recitations, he reports on other matters; for example, without undue dismay the malfunction of all(!) of his fathometers on the first day of an important trip in 1963 through Cataract Canyon, Utah, soon to be flooded in its lower end by the Colorado River pooling behind Glen Canyon Dam (closed 1963). As a wandering minstrel, he breaks into long verse and tippler's humor during the seminal hydrological field trip in **Grand Canyon**, 1964.

"The plane-table maps (Series XIX) contained in the collection are geological art compiled by Leopold and field companions and students in the team he named the 'River Boys' (the field long was traditionally the realm of men, although no longer so by the time of Leopold's formal retirement). The maps not only graphically preserve the detailed measurements of the day on numerous creeks and rivers across the United States, but they record a deft hand at the alidade, using hand-driven methods with no more than a keen eye, sharp pencil, arithmetic tables, and at least one dedicated rodman moving about in the distance—or in another instance documented by a pencilled sketch, a rodman holding the tall stadia rod vertically in a canoe. In the Grand Canyon, he plotted the flowlines of whitewater rapids by using the expedition's rafts as floats, tracking them with rapid-fire plane-table measurements from shore while they ran the rapids, communicating with the boats by walkie-talkie. [\checkmark Only a few of the plane-table maps are from the Grand Canyon expedition.] An artistic hand brings form rather than rude interface to stream edges, delineated by constellations of rod points and elevations. Less precise or mechanical by today's standards of laser-ranging devices, GPS receivers, radios, and digital tablets, the Leopold maps are the original field records for important hydrogeological principles then under development, which today are the core subject of coursework in hydrology classrooms and laboratories. The maps also are in some cases the earliest known records of the hydrological and geomorphological characteristics of many stream courses, which since have been greatly altered, anew or continuously, by human activities. And in some cases, Leopold has doodled sketches on the maps, artfully depicting field equipment or observations; for example, an owl and a dutch oven."

Opportunity is taken here to transcribe the names of the people who appear in this list, including those that were emended or added, as a record of this often-mentioned **"first 100"** river runners who completed transits through the Grand Canyon. Most notably, the second Powell expedition is absent because Dock did not recognize the incomplete canyon transit; and individuals who did only partial trips on runs that otherwise went completely through the canyon are not included. The question comes up frequently enough, but not usually with a transcription of names or with complete direction to the list, thus it is transcribed below. The earliest individuals in this list are all included separately in this biographical bibliography, but in the later years fewer people appear in the bio-bibliography (as explained more completely in the Introduction) because there are no separately published biographically pertinent accounts for them for which it is necessary to include them herein. Also, because of the overlap of individuals in this list and the bio-bibliography, and in order to avoid unintended duplications, the "first 100" list is not applied to the "Head Count" of the bio-bibliography. Dock's chronological list is generally alphabetical within years, and names are as recorded by him. (As a matter of record, Dock also had compiled a "second 100" list, which is more subjective and not generally referred to and is not further noted herein.)

Elmer Mateas sued the Fred Harvey company for injuries sustained when "Chiggers", a mule, bucked him off during a ride down Bright Angel Trail. The Los Angeles Times reported briefly that Mateas in the end won his suit for the injury that had occurred in 1942 ("Mule Victim Gets \$7500", November 4, 1948, p. 6). (The case reports cited below, while repeating at length the circumstances of the mule trip and the accident, do not indicate the date of the injury nor the amount of compensation demanded.) For a photo of Mateas see in The Rotarian, Vol. 84, no. 2 (February 1954), p. 44 (in an article not otherwise pertinent to this biobibliography). Law professor Mason Ladd was enamored by the Chiggers case, using it in his classrooms, animatedly (see Ehrhardt below).

Almost immediately Chiggers took up his old trick of pressing forward. In a half hour or so, while Chiggers was pressing the mule ahead, appellant reined him back, and Chiggers started bucking, throwing and seriously injuring appellant."

"One of the accountants in the employ of Fred Harvey, the public utilities operator at Grand Canyon Park, has the distinction of being America's first incubator bady [sic]. He is 44-year-old, 5-foot 6-inch Perlee Merrill Mathers, who made a premature debut in Lynn, Massachusetts, in 1890 when his mother became frightened over an accident to another son. At birth he weighed but 16 ounces and was eight inches long.

"In 1890 incubators were just an experiment and the nearest one was in New York. While it was being rushed to the Mathers home Perlee lived in a cigar box for 56 hours, wrapped in cotton.

"The baby's survival was of considerable interest to the medical profession and Perlee was to have been exhibited at the 1893 World'[s] Fair in Chicago, but when the Fair was delayed his parents changed their minds and only the incubator was sent. Now Mr. Mathers is searching for the incubator for a keepsake." (ENTIRE ITEM)

(Other than the notice from 1934, Matthers' period of employ at Grand Canyon is not determined here. Newspapers in 1949 printed variations of a human-interest story that indicated that Mathers, then 59, was still looking for the incubator, which had been exhibited at the World's Fair and the Smithsonian. A Chicago Bureau press photo (not otherwise identified) indicated that at this time Mathers had been employed by Fred Harvey for a total of 41 years. His newspaper obituary noted that incubator found in New York had fortunately just arrived from France, and that he had spent his first four months in it. He retired from Fred Harvey in 1958 as an office manager and he had "help set up the system in Union Station [Kansas City?] in 1914".)

McHenry even tried guiding from above in a plane with a megaphone, but that was short-lived as the motor drowned out the talk. He then worked at several other parks. At the National Capital Parks he started an popular urban campfire program.

"Donald was appointed Park Naturalist of Yosemite National Park, January 9, 1947. Prior to this appointment he had been at the Grand Canyon National Park, Arizona and in the Washington office of the Naturalist Division. He entered the Government Service in 1919. Mr. McHenry, an accomplished musician, contributed freely of his time and talent to all musical programs. He retired from the Park Service March 31, 1956."

Moeri was born in Switzerland and was a naturalized U.S. citizen in 1913. At the time of his WWI draft registration on 5 June 1917 he was listed as a chef at the Chicago Golf Club, Wheaton, Illinois; on that registration he also noted that he had been a private of artillery in the Swiss army. He was only briefly at Grand Canyon and seems to have spent most of his remaining life in Evanston, Illinois, though he died in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He is buried in St. Mary's Cemetery, Northbrook, Illinois.

Murakami was a long-time Fred Harvey employee, 36 years, leaving the canyon in 1965. He was a bellman in El Tovar, and served Dwight Eisenhower when the general visited the canyon. He was promoted to Bell Captain probably in 1954. His sobriquet, "Chinaman George", was not one of disrespect; in fact, during the war he even received mail overseas addressed as such, presumably from those who could not recall his actual name. Kishi, the soldier who is commemorated on the American Legion memorial in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery, who may have been added at Murakami's suggestion; *see also* Kishi *herein*). Nuttall also publishes there a photo of Technical Sergeant Murakami (not Staff Sergeant as indicated in legend), *ca.* 1946, at the rim of the canyon, which is also

published (correctly as Technical Sergeant) in the article by Nuttall cited below. Murikami remained a member of Grand Canyon's American Legion John Ivens Post No. 42 even after he left the canyon.

Nabokov seems to periodically attract interest for his poetry about having discovered a new species of butterfly at Grand Canyon, but specifics seem to be scattered in the literature and and general readers can be confused about the particulars of the species name when it is colloquially misused. Nabokov did indeed name a new species from the Grand Canyon, *Neonympha dorothea*, but specifically the Grand Canyon specimens were of one subspecies among several that he named, the Grand Canyon subspecies, *Neonympha dorothea dorothea*, beng the so-called "nominate taxon". The other subspecies were not from Grand Canyon, thus technically the "Grand Canyon" discovery is restricted to the one subspecies, not to the species as a whole. Furthermore, Nabokov's taxa have since been restudied and have been transferred to other genera and species, which are subjective acts of systematics. A complete Nabokov-Grand Canyon list of citations is provided here to assist users in seeing how science and literature can intertwine.

James Ferriss and L. E. Daniels, despite being called "bug hunters" by Orr, were naturalists whose real focus was in malacology (the study of mollusks). Ferriss, in fact, had been in the canyon before, in 1906, with Philadelphia malacologist Henry Pilsbry (for whom see separately herein), when the two men spent time with Bass and crossed the canyon to Shinumo Creek. Regretfully, neither Pilsbry nor Ferriss wrote of their 1906 personal experiences, producing only scientific publications from their collections. (However, Pilsbry's telegraphically formed field notes, essentially all technical, were transcribed as Appendix 1 (pp. 65-68) in Earle E. Spamer and Arthur E. Bogan, "Mollusca of the Grand Canyon and Vicinity, Arizona: New and Revised Data on Diversity and Distributions, with Notes on Pleistocene-Holocene Mollusks of the Grand Canyon", Proceedings of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia, 144 (1993): 21-69.) Orr, on the other hand, a dentist and Ferriss's cousin, was just "along for the ride", as it were, and he wrote this very engaging story of the 1909 trip. Their experiences at the canyon are extracted, with notes, on pp. 504-513 in "My God, there it is!" The World Encounters the Grand Canyon, which omits that part of their travels across the Arizona Strip and Kaibab Plateau. He published a number of photographs from the expedition in the series, which may be unique for its rich record of an early trip on the Bass trails across the canyon. The excerpt also omits some preliminaries between Chicago and Arizona.

Orr included a poem, "The Song of the Shinumo", at the close of the second installment (March), but which probably should have been printed in the third installment (May) where Orr refers to "the song of the Shinumo". The poem is transcribed in its entirety on pp. 792-793 in "My God, there it is!" The World Encounters the Grand Canyon.

For decades James Ohio Pattie has been mentioned in passing, though occasionally with some more thoughtful commentary, as having once during his trapping exploits passed by the Grand Canyon. It is based solely on the poorly edited rendition of his story about his exploits through the Southwest though what then was Mexico, during which he was for a while imprisoned by Mexican authorities and when his father and fellow trapper died. The sum total of this record that has been interpreted as the passage by Grand Canyon is transcribed here to allow users of this bio-bibliography to determine for themselves the reliability of the rendition and later interpretations of it. Pattie relates (1831, pp. 97-98, omitting only a sentence that may be offensive to Native Americans) that as the ascended the lower Colorado River valley to the north,

"On the 28th [of March, 1827] we reached a point of the river where the mountains shut in so close upon its shores, that we were compelled to climb a mountain, and travel along the acclivity, the river still in sight, and at an immense depth beneath us. Through this whole distance, which we judged to be, as the river meanders, 100 leagues, we had snow from a foot to eighteen inches deep. The river bluffs, on the opposite shore, were never more than a mile from us. It is perhaps, this very long and formidable range of mountains, which has caused, that this country of Red river [the Colorado], has not been more explored, at least by the American people. A march more gloomy and heartwearing, to the people hungry, poorly clad, and mourning the loss of their companions, cannot be imagined. O[u]r

horses had picked a little herbage, and had subsisted on the bark of shrubs. Our provisions were running low, and we expected every hour to see our horses entirely give out.

"April 10th, we arrived where the river emerges from these horrid mountains, which so cage it up, as to deprive all human beings of the ability to descend to its banks, and make use of its waters. No mortal has the power of describing the pleasure I felt when I could once more reach the banks of the river.—Our traps, by furnishing us beavers, soon enabled us to renew our stock of provisions. We likewise killed plenty of elk, and dressed their skins for clothing. On the 13th we reached another part of the river, emptying into the main river from the [page break] north. Up this we all trapped two days. [...]

"On the 11th, we returned to the banks of Red river, which is here a clear beautiful stream. We moved very slowly, for our beasts were too lean and worn down, to allow us to do otherwise."

Coming up the lower Colorado River, it is clear that the party had been pushed somewhat inland by the impassable canyons they encountered, and their sighting of the river from above could be best interpreted as a view along this reach, at Black Canyon or downsteam from there. But beyond this point their route is barely described; and just where they "emerged" to reach the river banks again is geographically nebulous. It's possible they traced what would later be known as the thirty-fifth parallel route that was followed at different times by Beale, Whipple, and Ives on their expeditions in the 1850s—but frankly, if they saw the Grand Canyon anywhere it is not truly recorded. Topographically it is practically impossible that they "traced" the Grand Canyon on their march; yet based on the historical attention given to Pattie, and his supposed passage by the canyon, the published record is documented here.

"... comfortably lounging on the terrace overlooking this greatest of all great canyons, an old-timer is talking of 'the good old days of Hance's camp before this high-falutin' hotel was built.' And at this mere suggestion I become vividly aware that, after all, the way I like best to see anything is comfortably. Perhaps there might be an added awe if one stood alone at the brink of this yawning abyss, perhaps some of the gnarled roads and small clefts that seemed wonderful when we were crawling among them [across country] might have seemed dull little places from the terrace of a luxurious hotel, but being at heart—no matter how much I might pretend to be above the necessity of comfort—an effete Easterner, I very gratefully appreciate the genius of the man who built this hotel for such as I."

And no further remark about the canyon, a stay which set her back some \$25. On pages 273-274 she carefully itemizes her expenses between Williams and through her stay at Grand Canyon, which included two rooms at El

Tovar (bath between, \$10) and another room at \$5 (for Edwin), including meals, a mule trip down Bright Angel Trail (\$4) (with no mention of that trip in her narrative, nor who it was that went down), and "Moving pictures exhibited at studios of trip through Colorado river" (sic) (\$3) (obviously the Kolb Studio presentation for several people), "Tips, per day, about \$1.25", and "Sundries, etc." (\$1.80). (The freight charge to send the car ahead to Los Angeles was \$151.20, "no crating and no delay"). A photo between pp. 184/185 is captioned, "Our chauffeur takes a day off at the Grand Canyon of the Colorado" (in the text he is identified as the "chauffeur" in quotation marks, in as much as this is son Edwin).

NOTE! This poem is plagiarized, apparently usurped as a contribution to the Santa Fe Railway's promotions of the Grand Canyon. It is in fact a poem by Fannie Isabel Sherrick (Frances Isabella "Fannie" Sherrick Wardell, 1859–1927), titled "The Black Cañon", on pp. 82-84 in Sherrick's *Star-Dust* (Belford, Clarke and Co., Chicago, New York, San Francisco, 1888). Sherrick-Wardell had actually written of the Black Canyon in Colorado, which although that geographical feature is also known as the Grand Canyon of the Gunnison River, the theft of her work for Arizona's Grand Canyon is as peculiar as it is unpardonable.

In the Santa Fe version, one line of the first stanza has been changed. Wardell's line reads, "The cleft is dark below, / Where foaming flows the Sumbre river;" (surely "somber river" although she used "sumbre" for "somber" in one other place in the volume). The same line in the Santa Fe version ends with an awkward rhythm as well as concluding with a period: "The cleft is dark below, / Where foaming flows the Colorado river." Some spelling differences are noted, too, but it is otherwise a word-for-word piracy. The Santa Fe version also obscures the typographical arrangement of the stanzas by printing the poem's lines flush-left. Sherrick-Wardell seems never to have written about the Grand Canyon of Arizona. Riesberg's appropriated poem also was reprinted a decade later, promotional again and with typographical adjustments, as "The Grand Canyon of Arizona" in *Progressive Arizona* (the Official Organ of the Automobile Club of Arizona), 2(6) (June 1926):5.

Sherrick-Wardell's poem also appeared as "The Black Canon" on p. 51 in *Beautiful Gems of Thought and Sentiment* (compiled by Henry Davenport Northrop; McDermid and Logan, London, Ontario, 1890), which corrects "Sumbre" to "sombre" but omits credit to the author even though almost all other poems in the volume are credited. It also appeared in *The Mineral Collector*, 1(6) (August, 1894): 81-82, accompanied by an editor's introductory paragraph about Black Canyon under the title, "Cañons of Utah and Colorado", with "Sumbre" corrected to "somber". [The El Tovar venue mentioned by Dudley (1945), likely was confused with a reception venue.] The remark concerning windows seems to be an editorial assumption in *Time* magazine, perhaps based on photographs from the event, notwithstanding the Ranger-Naturalist's own remark (see below) of a "large picture window"—given that the open-air view of the canyon from inside could be journalistically described as a "picture window". The Yavapai venue is corroborated both by the report of the wedding in *The New York Times* (December 4, 1944, p. 25) and by the Superintendent's own Monthly Report (*fide* Kim Besom [January 9, 2024]), "On December 3 Colonel Elliot Roosevelt was united in marriage to Miss Faye Emerson (Warner Bros. Studio actress) at Yavapai Observation Station at 10:00 a.m. by Reverend Roger Sawyer of the Grand Canyon Community Church. Only a small group of friends were present because of bad weather which grounded several planes carrying invited guests, necessitating their arrival six hours late." Specifically, the separate report therein by Ranger-Naturalist Louis Schellbach provides more information:

[&]quot;On December 2 Colonel Elliott Roosevelt, son of our President, called the Park Naturalist at 10:15 p.m. from the El Tovar Hotel to help arrange his wedding plans at Grand Canyon National Park. Chief Ranger H. L. Bill accompanied the Park Naturalist. Miss Faye Emerson, the bride-to-be, could not decide on holding the ceremony in the hotel or Community Building. They were taken there to look over and it was there and then decided to hold the wedding ceremony there on the following morning

"December 2-6 — Col. Elliot Roosevelt and wife (took trip to Phantom Ranch, Dec. 4-5); Jack Frye, President, TWA, and wife; Col. C.A. Shoop and wife, Army Air Corps; Col. J.R. Hoover, Army Air Corps; Miss Chandler Roosevelt (daughter) [who was present as the Maid of Honor in the wedding party]; Mr. Robert Wells, (U.S. Secret Service [protection for Chandler]); Mr. John Meyer, Hollywood, California; Miss Janet Thomas, Hollywood, California; Mrs. Joseph Livengood (Granddaughter of Madame Schumann Heink); All of the above were members of the Roosevelt wedding party."

The Chief Ranger's report to the Superintendent has a section that reads:

"Colonel Elliot Roosevelt, second son of the president, and Miss Faye Emerson, Warner Bros. motion picture actress, were married at Yavapai Observation Station by Reverend Roger W. Sawyer of the Grand Canyon Community Church on December 3. The ceremony was performed before a small group of friends of the bride and the groom; however, the party might have been larger had not the weather grounded some of Colonel Roosevelt's associates at Kingman causing them to arrive about six hours late."

In a Congressional investigation into contracts in the national defense program, Elliott Roosevelt features throughout Part 40 (in 1947). His own testimony occurred over more than a day; part of the testimony on August 5, 1947, before a subcommittee of the Special Committee to Investigate the National Defense Program, concerned the Roosevelt–Emerson wedding (pp. 2405-24061; specifically pp. 24051-24056), in *Investigation of the National Defense Program : Hearings Before a Special Committee Investigating the National Defense Program, United States Senate, Eightieth Congress, First Session, Pursuant to S. Res. 46 . . . Part 40, Aircraft Contracts (Hughes Aircraft Co. and Kaiser-Hughes Corp.)* (U.S. Government Printing Office, 1947). An itemized accounting from Fred Harvey details the bills for the lodgings and entertainments at El Tovar, which apparently were mostly covered by Jack Frye, appear as part of Exhibit No. 2509 (pp. 24630-24632).

Following his graduation Secakuku worked as a tour car driver for guests at the El Tovar Hotel and as a dancer at Hopi House at the Grand Canyon. It was there that he met his wife Adiah Harris, a Harvey Girl, and they were married in 1922. Secakuku was also the owner of several trading

posts in northern Arizona, opening his first trading post at Two Guns around 1926 and later starting trading posts in Holbrook and Winslow, Arizona. Secakuku was a chief of the Snake Society and later became chief of the Shipaulovi Bear Clan following his retirement in the 1960's. Sekakuku— c'était son nom ouvrit la bouche (il est vrai qu'il était si essouflé qu'il eut eu peine à la fermer) devant ce ruban d'un si beau rouge et cette médaille qui brillait si joliment. Puis il s'en alla porter son nouveau fétiche aux hommes de sa tribu qui le félicitèrent en levant les bras au ciel." (*transl.* 'After which the King called the 'dance master' to him and pinned a medal to his breast, flapping like a wing. Sekakuku—that was his name—opened his mouth (it is true that he was so out of breath that he had difficulty closing it) in front of this ribbon of such beautiful red and this medal which shone so prettily. Then he went to take his new fetish to the men of his tribe who congratulated him by raising their arms to the sky.')

That boat is the eponymous *Charles H. Spencer*, abandoned at Lee's Ferry and sank in 1915, of which some of the wreckage and the boiler are still present in the river. The Spencer placer operation was during 1910-1913, although Spencer returned in the 1960s to attempt hydraulic mining for rhenium in the shales.

[Disambiguation: This Spencer is not to be confused with Charles Spencer (?-1886), a British-born army scout, guide, interrpeter, mail rider, and prospector who married a Hualapai woman, whose activities often show up in histories of this region.]

An Geological Congress-sponsored excursion to the Rockies included a side trip (from Denver) taken by some of the geologists to visit the Grand Canyon, which is the text (taken from pp. 218-231) that is presented in translation on pp. 245-251 in in "My God, there it is!" The World Encounters the Grand Canyon. The original French text is transcribed, with the accompanying translation, as Nº 354 in The Grand Canyon! A Worldwide, Year-By-Year Anthology and Annotated Bibliography.

What establishes this text as extraordinary is that it seems to be the only account of the trip <u>en route to</u> the canyon by this group of international geologists. While it is known that they encountered a storm, which waylaid them in a hastily assembled bivouac camp, this seems to be only description of the stormy night's pause. And of course, there is the description of the canyon itself—the first real overlook of the "crevasse", by a geologist, since Powell, though here as a new breed—the geologist-tourist. Regretfully, perhaps, he spends all too much time attempting to describe the forms and phases of the canyon's displays—like any other writing tourist. It is most disappointing, though, in that other than noting the presence of John Wesley Powell on this field trip (he had met them in Flagstaff), no remarks are recorded from him during their stay at the canyon.

Grove Karl Gilbert wrote for the Rocky Mountain excursion's guidebook a geological description of the rail journey from Albuquerque to Flagstaff, concluding with the note, "At Flagstaff the mode of travel changes; the party is conveyed by wagons and saddle horses, takes its meals out of doors, and sleeps in tents.* " [Gilbert here added a footnote in the post-expedition printing of the guidebook: "the prophecy of 'tents' was not verfied; the party bivouacked, and was so unfortunate as to encounter storms of rain, snow, and wind."] Gilbert also included in that volume a brief geological overview of the route from Flagstaff to Grand Canyon. (See Samuel Franklin Emmons, ed., Geological Guide-Book for an Excursion to the Rocky Mountains, John Wiley and Sons, New York, 1894. Interestingly, the guide information for the Grand Canyon itself is very limited, as compared to other destinations covered by the guidebook. Perhaps its reputation preceded the visit, with ample resources already available through Powell and Dutton.)

Given that the railroad was never built, nor were any truly technical studies published, virtually all references in the literature are historical in nature.

Also of special note is Stanton's Cave, probably the best-known of Grand Canyon's caves. Despite the more remote Rampart Cave's early fame following its public revelations beginning in the 1930s (see under Willis Evans herein), Stanton's Cave is seen yearly by thousands of boaters on the Colorado River, and it can be seen also by occasional hikers who make their ways into the more remote sections of Marble Canyon. It is gated and not open to general visitation, to protect its cultural and paleontological artifacts as well as the bat colony that calls it home. Stanton's Cave takes its name from the fact that the Colorado River expedition under Robert Brewster Stanton cached its boats and supplies here in 1889 after three men drowned in the river. It was an expedition to photographically document the proposed route of the Denver, Colorado Cañon & Pacific Railroad, the president of which was one of the fatalities (see Frank Mason Brown herein). In 1890, Stanton and company returned to continue the trip through the Grand Canyon and down the lower Colorado River. In the 1930s the first split-twig figurines were discovered here, made by Indigenous peoples of centuries past; and subsequent studies also found fossils of birds, other animals, and plants that record the changing environments of the Grand Canyon during the late Pleistocene "ice age" and afterward. The cave even stored the evidence of driftwood from monumental floods that once had rushed down the Colorado.

It is unclear whether Strong ever visited Grand Canyon herself, but her audacious proposal that would have unequivocally destroyed the Grand Canyon's river corridor warrants citations in this biographical bibliography.

A well-known Kolb Brothers photo was taken by Emery Kolb showing his brother, Ellsworth, and daredevil stunt pilot Royal V. Thomas beside the Lincoln Standard biplane that Thomas had landed on an improvised 500-foot air strip on the Tonto Plateau near Plateau Point beneath Grand Canyon village on August 8, 1922. This was the first airplane landing inside the Grand Canyon; sometimes overlooked in favor of a second, more highly publicized, landing (without Kolb) soon thereafter. Thomas had left from Williams, Arizona, with Ellsworth flying with him to film the exploit (for which Kolb had paid Thomas). Wind shifts necessitated that Thomas wait until the next day to take off, in which the aircraft was slightly damaged and repaired prior to departing the canyon.

Thomas repeated the feat ten days later, carrying *Fox News* cinematographer Anthony Ugrin. Fred Harvey company photographs of this venture were published with the article by Folger in *Popular Mechanics Magazine* and by C. J. Birchfield in *The Santa Fe Magazine*, the railway's own organ. The true first landing, with Kolb, was soon overshadowed and largely forgotten. (Fox News was a newsreel network established by William Fox that ran 1919–1930 in competition with other newsreel companies whose productions were shown in movie theaters. Aviator Thomas was killed in a flying accident in Teterboro, New Jersey.)

Anthony Ugrin's name has been consistently misspelled as Ugren and Ungren in the published articles. His name, Anthony A. Ugrin, is here confirmed through multiple U.S. Census records and California voter registrations, which also confirm his occupation variously as photographer or cameraman. He later worked with 20th Century Fox and was employed as a still photographer, and also appeared as an actor in films. Heber had been at Grand Canyon at the time when his brother, **Mark Austin Tracy** (1905–1927), a ranch hand near Kirkland, Arizona, died in Prescott after a riding accident. Mark is buried in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery. Refer to *In a Better Place* (Nuttall, 2016, p. 53) for brief biographical notes and photo, but no information is given as to what connection Mark may have had with Grand Canyon. Refer also to *Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery* (Anderson, 2015, p. 88) for photo and legend.

Noted here is the observation that Mark Tracy's grave marker is apparently his father's handiwork, fashioned from concrete with rough-hewn country rock pieces affixed atop and on the sides.

Also noted here is the fact that Heber's wife, **Roberta** (*née* Clawson, 1893–1957) was the daughter of Leo Herbert Clawson, a Santa Fe Railway employee at Grand Canyon, and Elizabeth Watson Clawson (*for whom see under* Clawson *in this biobibliography*). At the time of the 1940 census for Grand Canyon, their son, 16-year-old **Robert H. Tracy** was working doing "Janitor work Tourist Camp".

This biographical bibliography's general entry for the Trail of Time, is as much "biographical" in nature as are other grouped citations (pp. 80-81) for some of the expeditions that are separately cited in this bibliography. Its development and construction required the concerted effort of a large team and public input. While geologists Karlstrom and Laura Crossey appear prominently throughout the citations, an effort is made here to use the Trail of Time itself—like an expedition—as an acknowledgment of the substantial contributions of many other people, including those who participated in planning feedback.

In 1994, geologist Karl Karlstrom from the University of New Mexico, and others, proposed the construction of a "Trail of Time" along the already existing paved Rim Trail. After many concept studies and arrangements with the park, and supported by a multi-million-dollar funding from the National Science Foundation, a 4.6-km (3-mi) trail was laid out along the Rim Trail in Grand Canyon village. At pertinent locations along that chronologically marked trail, geological exhibits display the rocks—which can be

touched—of the many strata of the Grand Canyon, and their interpretation. The trail can be entered at several points and be informative in either direction and is accessible to wheelchairs and people with strollers and is convenient to shuttle bus stops and parking areas.

The trail is inlaid with small bronze markers, 3 feet (1 m) apart, each "giant step" representing one million years in the history of the earth from "Today" by the Yavapai museum westward to the origin of the earth at Maricopa Point, 4,560 Ma (million aeons ago), with one more, lone marker miles farther to the west at Pima Point that denotes the comparable "distance" to the origin of the universe, 13,750 Ma). The Trail of Time rock samples include fossils where appropriate. They are interpreted by striking informational signs at the appropriate "ages" along the trail. Most of the rocks and slabs, far larger than geologists' usual "hand specimens," were collected along the Colorado River and taken out of the canyon by raft. In a few cases where strata are not exposed along the river, the rocks were flown out strung together like a necklace beneath a heavy-lift helicopter.

As might be expected, the project was very complex, involving dozens of people and calling for substantial funding for concept preparation, planning and on-site testing, logistics of making rock collections, preparation of specimens, designing and manufacturing signage and ground markers, and installation, not to mention administrative assistance and permitting through the park. The recently published guide to the trail by Karl Karlstrom and Laura Crossey (2019) has an engaging, exhaustive text and is richly illustrated. Though written for the interested casual audience, the guide will be seen by professionals as informative to them as well. With it, even those who cannot visit the canyon can experience and learn from the Trail of Time.

✓ One will note that the citations here are not so much "guides" to the trail—there is one, by Karlstrom & Crossey (2018, 2019)— as they represent the effort of dozens of people, from concept to execution and interpretation. The human reaction to and impact from the trail's development is also demonstrated by these citations. The Trail of Time, from concept through interaction, is in every respect uniquely biographical.

George K. Davol, a San Francisco engineer, orchestrated a plan to build an aerial tram that would have passed from promontories and buttes across Grand Canyon. While he had the interest of the Santa Fe Railway from 1916, and tentative approval from the National Park Service, the plan was formally disapproved by the government in 1920. A field survey was made across the canyon in 1919, of which four different photograph albums are known, which presumably were for the benefit of investors. Three of the albums are in the Grand Canyon National Park Museum Collection; the fourth is in the Special Collections and Archives, Clline Library, Northern Arizona University.

This was a field meeting by rail of geographers principally from the U.S. and Europe who traveled aboard a private train from New York across the northern U.S., down the West Coast to San Francisco, and east across southern states, returning to New York via Washington, D.C. They visited sites of geographical and geological interest, including the Grand Canyon on October 2-3, where they arrived "early morning" on the 2nd, took in the picture show of "Mr. Kolb" in the evening, and one party went on a trail trip to the Colorado River on the 3rd while others went on rim excursions, and departed the canyon at 8 p.m.

Trans World Airlines Flight 2 United Air Lines Flight 718

On June 30, 1956, two commercial airliners collided high above Grand Canyon, crashing into the chasm near the confluence of the Little Colorado River. Numerous items pertain to the event, its aftermath, and to the 128 people who perished in the accident.

A small gravesite in the Grand Canyon Pioneer Cemetery contains in four coffins the remains of some who were recovered from the United Air Lines site. A memorial stone has engraved in it the names of all those who perished aboard that aircraft. It is sometimes mistakenly referred to as a memorial to all of the 1956 accident victims from both aircraft.

A mass grave with memorial plaque in the Flagstaff Citizens Cemetery contains the coffins of most of the individuals who died aboard the TWA aircraft (a few of the identified deceased were sent by request to families elsewhere).

In common with the average visitor, upon arrival you hurry up the steps from the station, pass along the front of the hotel, and go out at once to the Rim for a first view. You are impatient of delay in seeing this marvel of the world. Almost before you know it you are at the edge. The great abyss, without hint or warning, opens before your feet. For the moment the earth seems cleft in twain and you are left standing at the brink. As you pause there momentarily the rock platforms down below seem to heave, the buttes sway; even the opposite Rim of the Canyon undulates slightly. The depth yawns to engulf you. Instinctively you shrink back. If it were not for the presence of companions you might cry out. [¶] Ah! the terror of it! [¶] And, worse than that, the mad attraction of it, the dread temptation that lies within it! The chasm repels and yet draws."

And there is particlarly Van Dyke's memorable chapter, "From Dawn To Dusk", which he sets up with "Days and weeks can be given to Desert View without exhausting the scene or the interest" and concludes, "It is not the eighth wonder of the world but the first."

OCCUPATIONAL AND AVOCATIONAL INDEX

ALL OF THE PRIMARY individuals in this volume are in alphabetical order (including cross-referenced names), so it is not necessary to interleave persons' names in this index to occupational and avocational callings or activities.

Although the PDF document is searchable, this grouped index may be useful to those users who wish to understand the number of people who are noted for each category. Some of the stated occupations or callings, which are supplied herein for their more inclusive biographical evidence (as explained in the Introduction), may pertain to times before or after the person's presence at Grand Canyon. Earlier- and later-life occupations and avocations will be noticed throughout the volume.

Were the biographical notations and this volume restricted to times of visits to Grand Canyon or Colorado River journeys, it would occlude things for which a person might be more remembered, and which provide a larger picture of lifetime achievements and talents. In this manner the index and the notations through the volume furnish a lifetime record of the temperaments and attainments of people who were in some fashion attracted to the canyon. It may also be useful to know that a person who later became well known was ever at the canyon.

Explanatory Notes

The numerals refer to the individually enumerated entries throughout this volume. For convenience the principal person's name in the entry is noted, although in a some cases the name of a person associated with the principal person of the entry is given.

concessionaire employee (post-Fred Harvey) is denoted for concessionaire employees for the time following the end of "Fred Harvey" contracts and when the later concessionaire is not identified

Grand Canyon aficionado is a generalized term applied to individuals for whom no specific occupational or avocational credit has been obtained, though the evidence for their interest in the canyon is indicated through the context of the citation(s), or for whom special interests in the canyon are obvious

Grand Canyon resident is applied to those (usually children) who lived at Grand Canyon but apparently never were in employment there but are nonetheless noted in the citations given herein

National Park Service employee is designated for those who worked for the Park Service but were not among the ranger staffs

river runner is applied to any person who traveled on the Colorado River

river-running tourist is reserved for people who were clearly only tourist river runners

tourist is reserved for people who do not have a regular occupational or avocational classification listed for them

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ABOUT THE AUTHOR

My first field of study was geology at Rutgers University in the 1970s. For several years afterward I was in commercial publishing, writing about computer technology — before personal computers. In the early '80s I began a long period of employment in natural history study collections, first at the New Jersey State Museum, then in the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia. My 18 years in the Academy's employ began in 1986; before that I had been for 12 years a student research assistant and volunteer there. While on staff I was at various times a collection manager in several departments and collections—invertebrate paleontology, paleobotany, mineralogy, malacology, general modern invertebrates (a collection of organisms other than mollusks, insects and arachnids), diatoms, and botany; and continued to volunteer in vertebrate paleontology. My publications have embraced each of these fields—as well as historical and bibliographical topics about the Grand Canyon and Colorado River regions. Concurrently, for seven years I was editor and managing editor of the Scientific Publi-




cations branch of the Academy, which publishes peer-reviewed articles and monographs from authors around the globe in America's oldest uninterrupted line of serials on natural history, from 1817. My last five years at the Academy was as its Archivist, for which I had studied in the graduate program of Temple University's Department of History. On leaving the Academy in 2005 I continued my affiliation as an elected Research Associate. For the next 14 years I was Reference Archivist in the research library of the American Philosophical Society, a polymathic institution in Philadelphia founded in 1743 by Benjamin Franklin as an American analogue of the Royal Society in London, whose staff supports the society's membership and visiting researchers. Since November 2018 I am enjoying an active retirement continuing all of these interests.

Following two visits to the Grand Canyon in 1974 that included my first canyon hikes, I began work on a bibliography of the canyon and the lower Colorado River country. In 1981, the Grand Canyon Natural History Association (now the Grand Canyon Conservancy) published the first edition as a part of its new Monograph series of scholarly publications. A second edition appeared in 1990, with a supplement in 1993. In January 2000, a completely revised bibliography was placed on the Association's website as a searchable database, which was frequently updated. In 2012 I privately published the first edition of *THE GRAND CANON*, a much-embellished resurrection of the print monograph, now in digital (PDF) format that can be viewed in book layout on screen or printed to paper. The fifth edition (planned for early 2025) is significantly revised, including the years 1535–2024 and cites 110,000 items in 114 languages; this includes Volume 2, a now-separate *Cartobibliography*. In 2018 I established a website online, Raven's Perch Media (https://ravensperch.org), which hosts this bibliography and contains many other specialized bibliographies and historical resources pertaining to the Grand Canyon and the Lower Colorado River.

In 1989, the 28th International Geological Congress convened in Washington, D.C., which also offered an ambitious series of field trips across the United States, two of them on the Colorado River through Grand Canyon. My first river trip was with the IGC. In 1990, I began working as a geology interpreter on yearly summer trips in Grand Canyon for a Colorado River outfitter, continuing this until 2001. I also participated in two scientific study trips through the canyon under the Glen Canyon Environmental Studies program administered by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, on one of which I prospected for living mollusks, the first such investigation ever to have been made along this canyon river. In 1994, I had attended a Penrose Conference sponsored by the Geological Society of America, "From the Inside and the Outside: Interdisciplinary Perspectives on the History of Earth Science." This conference for the first time brought earth scientists and historians together to discuss how each approach research in their complementary fields; from it I developed new perspectives in my research activities, which extended into revisions of the Grand Canyon–Lower Colorado River bibliography. In 2000, I attended a geology symposium at Grand Canyon on "The Colorado River: Origin and Evolution," the proceedings of which were edited by Richard A. Young and me. In 2012 I was honored with the annual Pioneer Award from the Grand Canyon Historical Society. Among many affiliations I hold life memberships with the Grand Canyon Conservancy, the Grand Canyon River Guides, and the Arizona–Nevada Academy of Science.
