OVERVIEW. This part focuses on documents that pertain to the Havasupai and Hualapai tribes, traditional recent residents of the Grand Canyon, including social and other concerns of these tribes, and activities on behalf of these indigenous peoples. Other Native American tribes are included in this part only with respect to their activities on their traditional lands in the Grand Canyon region or with respect to the canyon in their heritage. Items relating to tribal cultural claims to the Colorado River are also included. Anthropological studies in general, which include the Havasupai, Hualapai, and Kaibab Band of Paiute Indians in particular, are also listed here.


NOTES FOR PART 17

THIS part of the bibliography relates to Native Americans of, and their relation with, the Grand Canyon. By default of their residency at and in the canyon, the Havasupai and Hualapai people are the principal focus of this part of the bibliography; also the nearby Kaibab Band of Paiute Indians. In addition, there are citations that relate in some fashion to the cultural relationships and claims that other tribes have in the Grand Canyon. This is not a bibliographical listing for the tribes in general; only their relationships with the canyon, though more comprehensively regarding the currently resident Havasupai and Hualapai.

Some topics that may seem to be out of scope, insofar as the tribal relationships with Grand Canyon are concerned, are included here. For example, some citations pertain to Havasupai legal claims against Arizona State University, which relate to the unsanctioned uses of blood samples that were given by tribal members to a university researcher specifically for research on diabetes in this community (a disease that disproportionately afflicts many of these people, and notably other tribal peoples as well). While this in itself may seem unrelated to the Grand Canyon, additional studies were conducted with the samples, without the permission or knowledge of those from whom the blood was taken. These other studies arrived at scientific conclusions and social statements, which were published, that are decidedly contrary to the cultural beliefs of the Havasupai people and their relationship with the Grand Canyon. The resolution of these legal issues has provided some positive outcome for the individuals and the tribe. Now the affair remains the subject of worldwide cautionary and instructive attention among bioethecists and legal scholars, citations about which are included here because of that far-reaching impact. Many of these publications were produced during the progress of the legal case, and thus they provide evolving perspectives of the issues prior to the final resolution between the tribal litigants and the university. The effects of this case further emphasize the weight and truth of cultural beliefs.

Not all of the Native American tribes who exercise cultural claims to the Grand Canyon may have citations listed in THE GRAND CANON, except in a general or summary fashion; only the publications that have come to our attention, and which relate specifically to activities in the Grand Canyon region, are cited herein. The cultures of the people who hold ancestral ties to the Grand Canyon span regions beyond the area focused on by THE GRAND CANON, yet the geographical definition of this bibliography is defined by physical geography. There certainly are many published works about each of these peoples that will provide a user with the important, more meaningful broader cultural perspectives, but they do not meet the geographically established criteria to be included herein. The Grand Canyon is a part of these peoples' ancestral landscapes and spiritual beliefs; indeed, it is not seen, nor participated in, with the same perspective beween these different peoples, as well as it is not seen in the same sense even between indivuals of one tribe or clan. This will have to suffice as an apology for the geographical boundaries imposed on this part of the bibliography. The boundaries are nearly as meaningless to Indigenous peoples as are political boundaries such as those of the national parks, forests, and most objectively, the reservations.

Matters relating to Native Americans who relocated to the Colorado River Indian Tribes' reservation on the lower Colorado River will be found in <u>Part 11, Section 3</u> of this bibliography.

Included in Part 17 are items that relate to Colorado River water rights of the Native American groups, although most of these also appear in <u>Part 12, Section 1</u> of this bibliography.

Special International Bibliographical Exhibit Relating to the Havasupai

Inasmuch as the Havasupai blood-use case has gained global attention with respect to the rights of Indigenous peoples and of individuals, as is testified by numerous citations in this part of the bibliography, so too have the Havasupai gained recognition in their struggle to assert and maintain their spiritual and cultural rights to the lands on which they live and to the natural resources on those lands. This has been especially evident in the late 20th and into the 21st centuries with threats engendered by uranium mining and real estate development that is taking place or is planned near the Havasupai Indian Reservation; these nearby lands are outside of the legislatively defined reservation but are a part of Havasupai traditional territory. Among the threats are impacts to the environment, not the least of which is the potential to pollute and to divert the groundwaters so important to the Havasupai in Havasu Canyon. The threats can impact spiritual needs, which also can also adversely impact the economic livelihood of the tribe.

Although this bibliography omits newspaper and website sources that do not provide supporting information for a cited publication (as explained in the introductory matter to this volume), the following series of citations is introduced here as one example of the profound reach that the Havasupai plight has had, which may result in more far-reaching publications from around the world. The tribe's activities in response to its concerns are an example for other Indigenous peoples, who have comparable and unique issues alike, which may call for political, legal and moral activism by themselves or on their behalf.

This special bibliographical exhibit cites a single, feature-length article from *The Guardian*, a London-based daily newspaper, which has been posted to the website of the globally involved organization, World BEYOND War (<u>https://worldbeyondwar.org/who/</u>). There the organization also offers user-selected, automated translations of the article in dozens of non-English languages. The 13 non-English citations listed with the English original, below, have been selected from among these offerings because they represent the organization's outreach to specific *Indigenous* peoples and their supporters. The citations further demonstrate the growing global awareness for cultural rights in general, *in the process also bringing attention back to the Havasupai of Grand Canyon through the words of other Indigenous peoples*. The user-selected translations further allow Indigenous groups to immediately obtain a pertinent translation of the original article that is in English, a demonstration of how documentary resources are becoming more efficiently far-reaching in the web age.

The citations have been standardized for this bibliography in order for each to stand alone. Web links in this special exhibit were accessed in November 2019, and again in November 2021.

THIS APPENDIX contains citations taken from the scarce, occasional, mimeographed, missionary-toned serial produced at Supai, Arizona, at least during 1957 through 1959. Holdings are noted for it in the "Arizona Memory Project" of the Arizona State Library (<u>https://azmemory.azlibrary.gov/digital/collection/supaiweekly</u>), which serve also as the digital copies available through the "Chronicling America" website of the Library of Congress (<u>https://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/lccn/sn95060774/</u>).

As outlined by the Arizona Memory Project [square brackets are a part of the quotation, but *bracketed notes in italics are added here*]:

The *Supai Weekly News* appeared in the 1950s [*there is no indication when the first issue appeared*], published by Marian [*L*.] Collins, whose husband, Arthur "Vic" Collins, was the Bureau of Indian Affairs agent to the Havasupai Indians starting in about 1952. Vic often administered insulin shots to community members with diabetes and handled tourism inquiries, according to a 1959 *Arizona Republic* [LCCN: sn 83045137] article. As reported in the *Verde Independent* [LCCN: sn 94050876], Marian rotated roles as a nurse, mediator, and postmaster in Supai. Marian also taught at the Indian School in Havasu Canyon, according to a 1953 article in the *Arizona Republic*.

The *Supai Weekly News* was geared toward the Havasupai community. Each issue [*i.e., many issues*] featured a list of birthdays that week [*including dates*], as well as a weather report that detailed the daily temperatures from the week prior [*the entire record is nearly contiguous*]. The publication included important news such as public health updates, the upcoming visits of a relocation officer, and notices of tribal council meetings and elections. Though only two or three pages in length [*among the 88 issues seen, some were one page, a few were four pages, and two were five pages*], most issues were packed with listings of personal updates from community members. These updates often highlighted the little things in life, such as someone going sledding or someone cooking a steak dinner. These snippets of news sometimes answered questions, such as one in the June 26, 1957 issue: "All the shouting and screaming every afternoon is coming from the 'old swimming hole' where all the folks get away from the heat." The paper also sometimes took on a more poetic tone, such as in one 1959 issue: "When we go to bed at night the Valley is bright with the beautiful moonlight. When we get up early in the morning the Canyon is still light from the moon's beams. It is so pretty it makes some folks want to write poetry about it."

The paper also featured religious news about the Supai Bible Mission, such as when different services were being held and the names of missionaries. The paper frequently encouraged readers to attend church services, and most issues included a bible verse. [Various other items are moral and inspirational messages.]

Though initially a weekly publication, by 1959, the paper was published more sporadically and [*beginning November 28, 1958*] dropped "Weekly" from its name. By 1960, the Collinses moved to Cottonwood, Arizona, and the *Supai News* ceased.

Published in such a remote location, this serial is understandably scarce, although there is evidence in a few of the items that it was also mailed to recipients in the "outside world". As shown in the calendars on the *following two pages*, the issues preserved by these two institu-

tions are weekly to occasional, although it is not clear from these holdings that the more significant hiatuses are due to missing issues or that there really was a pause in production —although the issues are dated, they are not enumerated by volume or issue numbers. Even though the Library of Congress calendars itemize issues through December 1959, the LOC catalog record erroneous indicates "195?–1958" and "Ceased in 1958"; the calendar, however, is correct. All 88 indicated issues are available through either the Arizona or LOC website.

The hiatus in July 1957 was explained in the July 19 issue: "Mrs. Collins finally got a better typewriter and she is very thankful! The Supai News has not been published for over two weeks as the typewriter was no good and Supai was too busy a place to take time out for the paper. Things are now back in a normal state again." Other hiatuses, which are noted in the bibliographical litings below, are not explained, which could represent missing issues. Hiatuses are indicated for long periods, of course, but also for shorter intervals for which, notably, the weather records do not "catch up" for that interval.

The "Official Weather Report" ("Official Altitude—3,205 feet above sea level") that appears in almost every issue was compiled variously by Arthur Collins (signed "A.V.C.", later as "avc") and Marian Collins (signed "M.L.C." or "mlc"), with later reports signed only "c". Each report lists high and low temperatures and precipitation amount for each day; the records are virtually complete, except for times when the Collinses were not present.

Because of the unusual nature and scarcity of this serial, the opportunity is taken here in THE GRAND CANON to subjectively record citeable items in one place (this Appendix). A chronological presentation is maintained here due to the fact that the entire production was under the editorship of Marian L. Collins, with no by-lines. A few items by others, in the form of signed letters to recipients in Supai, are cited much as in the fashion of the citations from *The New York Times* (Part 3 of this bibliography); authors' names are appended in **bold**. A few items have also been cited in pertinent other parts of this bibliography; for example, death notices, the report of an earthquake, and so on.

Each issue is rich in personal names—Havasupai, government officials, visitors, and tourists. For example, the first of the 88 issues here examined (January 2, 1957), a twopage issue, contains 35 names (plus "Lucky", the Post Office dog). The lists of people visiting Supai, including tourists, can be rather lengthy for the size of this serial, particularly during the traditional summer tourist season. Often, the lists are segregated by those who are staying at the "Old Lodge" or "New Lodge", camping, or staying at Wampler Camp. Every issue contains a remarkable list of comings and goings of Havasupai people, too, whether going "up" on visits, shopping trips, doctor's visits, rounding up horses, and so on. Arrivals of Havasupai are noted, too, as are even phone calls from people "up top".

Most names that appear in the *News* show up in brief, folksy items that make up the preponderant part of this entire serial. Three examples, at random, are as follows (these are the entire entries). January 23, 1957: "Willie Spoonhead, Andrew Manakta, and Moby Dick Hamidreek have been fencing in their garden pits."; "Lucy Grounds curls her hair on curlers she makes from coffee cans. When she opens a can of coffee she saves the strips and cuts them into short pieces to wind her hair on. She sure has some pretty curls." August 14, 1957: "The Reed Watahomigies have a nice new radio."

Only principal items are cited here; usually those indicated by section or individual titles. A few miscellaneous citations are from among the informal notes in passing, if they convey information that is especially noteworthy for other parts of this bibliography; for example, notes of cultural interest.
